

- **WHEREAS,** breast cancer has the second highest mortality rate in women, and is the second most diagnosed cancer; and
- **WHEREAS,** every two minutes a woman is diagnosed with breast cancer, and 30% of new women's cancer diagnoses will be for breast cancer; and
- **WHEREAS,** 1 out of every 8 women in the United States will be diagnosed with breast cancer during her lifetime; and
- **WHEREAS,** by the end of December, 2023, there will be an estimated 297,790 new cases of invasive breast cancer diagnosed in women, and 55,720 cases of non-invasive, for a total of 353,510 new cases; and
- **WHEREAS,** men can also get breast cancer, and an estimated 2,800 men will be diagnosed with it in 2023; and
- WHEREAS, as of September, 2023, there were 4 million breast cancer survivors in the United States; and
- **WHEREAS,** both women and men are encouraged to learn more about how this disease may affect their lives and to take the necessary steps for early detection and prevention; and
- **WHEREAS,** death rates from breast cancer have been declining, and these changes are thought to be the results of treatment advances, earlier detection through screenings, and increased awareness; and
- **WHEREAS,** the efforts of the Merced City Firefighters, IAFF Local #1479 and the City of Merced Fire Department support going pink for the month of October to raise awareness about breast cancer; and

NOW, THEREFORE, I, MATTHEW SERRATTO, Mayor of the City of Merced, do hereby proclaim the month of October, 2023 as Breast Cancer Awareness Month in the City of Merced, State of California, and urge all citizens of Merced to take cognizance of this event and participate fittingly in its observance.
