Ms. GONZALEZ stated that heavy traffic occurs on 25^{th} Street; drivers use 25^{th} Street as a detour when a train is crossing the nearby railroad tracks and they speed through at a rate between 40 - 45 mph. Ms. GONZALES also indicated that neighborhood residents have tried placing safety cones out on the street to slow down traffic and protect children at play, however it has not been successful; drivers still speed through the area creating a safety hazard.

Chairperson SON informed that a traffic study is in progress and based on the traffic study, there are approximately 50 vehicles traveling in the area per hour. Mr. SON also informed that speed bumps will be ineffective due to the fact that vehicles will maneuver around the speed bumps or slow down when going over the speed bumps and then accelerate when they have passed the speed bumps.

Committee Member HREN agreed that speed bumps will be ineffective. Mr. HREN provided Ms. GONZALES a copy of the "Summary of Neighborhood Traffic Calming Guidelines Process". Mr. HREN also specified that the Committee is familiar with the noted issues on 25th Street as the subject has been brought up in past Traffic Committee meetings. Mr. HREN also indicated that the neighborhood traffic calming guidelines require the neighborhood to pay for any kind of traffic calming that is approved.

Mr. SON stated that increased police enforcement in the area would be an appropriate resolution until the current speed study is completed.

Ms. GONZALES concluded that a resolution needs to be done to slow down traffic in the area and it needs to be done for the children, especially near the park.

2. <u>Request #18-007 – Request for Improvement of Pedestrian Crosswalk in</u> <u>the Intersection of 16th and Canal Streets Crosswalk (Cecilio Solano)</u> (*Citizen requests the alteration of a regular pedestrian crosswalk to* "controlled" crosswalk for pedestrian safety in heavily-trafficked intersection.)

CECILIO SOLANO was present at the meeting. Mr. SOLANO voiced that there needs to be some sort of protection for pedestrians who are attempting to cross the busy intersection at 16th and Canal St. He indicated that many drivers do not stop for pedestrians making it complicated for pedestrians to cross safely; many times pedestrians run across barely reaching the other side of the street, and some pedestrians are disabled therefore getting across is more of a challenge for them. Mr. SOLANO suggested installing flashing lights on the pedestrian crosswalk to alert

drivers to stop for pedestrians.

Committee Member JUAN OLMOS responded that installing a lighted crosswalk is not going to fix the problem; it creates a false security for pedestrians and places them in greater danger because drivers do not always stop when they see the flashing lights. Mr. OLMOS also indicated that the safest option for pedestrians is to cross at a signal light.

Mr. SOLANO responded that the crosswalk is in constant use; nothing flags a driver now and he has witnessed numerous distracted drivers - this is always going to be an issue and improvement is warranted.

Chairperson SON recommended the Public Works Streets Division repaint the crosswalk with high-visibility/thermoplastic paint.

Considers amending Exhibit A of Resolution No. 2018-38, authorizing the establishment of Annual Special Tax Rates for Fiscal Year 2018-19 to correct Special Tax Rates typographical error for Improvement Area 35.

RECOMMENDATION

City Council - Adopt a motion adopting **Resolution 2018-53**, a Resolution of the City of Merced, California, acting as the Legislative Body of the Community Facilities No. 2003-2 (Services) of the City of Merced, amending Resolution No. 2018-38 to correct Exhibit A thereto related to the Annual Special Tax Rates for said district for Fiscal Year 2018-19.

AUTHORITY

Correct a typographical error in Exhibit A of Resolution No. 2018-38, which sets the Annual Special Tax Rates for fiscal year 2015-16 for Community Facilities District No. 2003-2 (Services) (the "District") pursuant to Chapter 2.5 (commencing with Section 53311) of Part 1 of Division 2 of Title 5 of the California Government Code (the "Act"), commonly known as the "Mello-Roos Community Facilities Act of 1982."

CITY COUNCIL PRIORITIES

As provided for in the FY2018-19 Adopted Budget.

DISCUSSION

Pursuant to the Mello-Roos Community Facilities District Act of 1982 and City's Ordinance No. 2144, specifies that the City Council by resolution annually set the special tax rates. The rates of the special taxes may increase each year by the average of the Consumer Price Index, Urban Wage Earners, and the Clerical Workers category for the San Francisco Oakland, San Jose and the United States' City averages. The rates were to be set at the maximum taking into account the 3.068% allowable

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increase from Fiscal Year 2017-18 levels.

On June 4, 2018, Council adopted Resolution No. 2018-38, Authorizing the Establishment of an Annual Special Tax Rates for Community Facilities District (CFO) No. 2003-2 (Services) for Fiscal Year 2018-19 including Exhibit A. However, there is a typographical error for Improvement Area 35 Single Family rate in Exhibit A. The Special Tax Rate for Improvement Area 35 Single Family should have read \$734.52 instead of \$735.52 referenced therein. It is appropriate to correct Fiscal Year 2018 -19 Special Tax Rates (Exhibit A) by amending Resolution No. 2018-38.

WHEREAS, the City Council (the "Legislative Body") of the City of Merced, California (the "City") had previously initiated proceedings, held public hearings, conducted elections and received a favorable vote from the qualified electors to authorize the levy of special taxes in and for the Community Facilities District No. 2003-2 (Services) of the City of Merced (the "District"), including Annexation Nos. 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11 and 12, all as authorized pursuant to the terms and provisions of the "Mello-Roos Community Facilities Act of 1982," being Chapter 2.5, Part 1, Division 2, Title 5 of the Government Code of the State of California (the "Act"); and

WHEREAS, on June 4, 2018, the Legislative Body of the City adopted Resolution No. 2018-38 authorizing the establishment of an annual special tax for Fiscal Year 2018-2019 at the tax rate set forth in Exhibit A, attached to said Resolution; and

WHEREAS, due to a typographical error on Exhibit A relating to Improvement Area 35, it is necessary to correct the Exhibit to reflect the correct special tax rate.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, DETERMINED AND ORDERED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MERCED, ACTING AS THE LEGISLATIVE BODY OF THE COMMUNITY FACILITIES DISTRICT NO. 2003-2 (SERVICES) OF THE CITY OF MERCED, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. The above recitals are all true and correct.

SECTION 2. In accordance with the Act and the Ordinance, there is hereby levied upon all parcels within the District, which are not otherwise exempt from taxation under the Act or the Ordinance, the special taxes for Fiscal Year 2018-

2019 at the tax rate set forth in the Exhibit "A" (Corrected), which rates do not exceed the maximum rates set forth in the Ordinance. After adoption of this Resolution, the District may make any necessary modifications to these special taxes to account for any unforeseen circumstances; provided, however, that any such modifications shall not result in an increase in the tax applicable to a category and can only be made prior to the submission of the Fiscal Year 2018-2019 Certified List to the County Auditor.

SECTION 3. The Finance Officer is hereby authorized and directed to prepare or cause the preparation of the Fiscal Year 2018-2019 Certified List and to submit such list to the County Auditor on or before August 10th or such later date to which the County Auditor may agree.

SECTION 4. The special tax shall be collected in the same manner as ordinary *ad valorem* property taxes are collected, and shall be subject to the same penalties and same procedure and sale in cases of any delinquency for *ad valorem* taxes, and the Tax Collector is hereby authorized to deduct reasonable administrative costs incurred in collecting any said special tax.

SECTION 5. It is hereby further directed that a certified copy of this Resolution, together with the Certified List for Fiscal Year 2018-2019, also be filed with the County Auditor.

SECTION 6. The County Auditor is hereby directed to enter in the next County assessment roll on which taxes will become due, opposite each lot or parcel of land effected in a space marked "public services, special tax" or by any other suitable designation, the installment of the special tax.

SECTION 7. The County Auditor shall then, at the close of the tax collection period, promptly render to the District a detailed report showing the amount and/or amounts of such special tax installments, interest, penalties and percentages so collected and from what property collected, and also provide a statement of any percentages retained for the expense of making any such collection.

SECTION 8. This Resolution shall become effective upon its adoption.





DISCUSSION

The University of California Merced and community celebrated the grand opening of the UC Merced Downtown Campus Center in January 2018. The \$45-million, 67,400 gross square foot building has capacity for up to 370 employees. UC Merced representatives discussed with City staff a request to lease parking spaces in the Merced Center Garage to accommodate the employees at the Downtown Campus Center. UC Merced desires to lease 125 parking spaces in the Merced Center Garage (100 covered parking spaces and 25 non-covered parking spaces.) The proposed Facility Use Agreement (Parking Agreement) contains the terms to lease parking from the City of Merced - Parking Authority

employees

In 2006, the City Council approved funding for the construction of the Merced Center Garage by the former Redevelopment Agency. Plan specifications called for a 3-story structure with 335 parking spaces and 10,180 square feet of leasable commercial space and storage. Development of the Merced Center Garage was intended to support the Merced College Business Resource Center and Ghia Hotel. The Business Resource Center is in full operation, but the Ghia Hotel project developer did not move forward.

There are 10 parking spaces on the 3rd Level of the Merced Center Garage dedicated to Merced College. The College participated in payment to design the parking facility, and received the 10 dedicated parking spaces in exchanged for their contribution. WestAmercia Bank leases 12 spaces from the City of Merced Parking Authority on the ground level as part of their lease.

On May 19, 2014, the City Council adopted Ordinance 2428 making parking within the entire Merced Center Garage available for lease with the exception of the spaces dedicated to Merced College and leased to WestAmerica Bank. The intent of the Ordinance Amendment was to provide an incentive to developers interested in the Merced Center Project.

Should Council approve the Facility Agreement with the Regents, 147 of the 335 parking spaces in the Merced Center Garage would be committed leaving 188 spaces available to the public.

Adjacent Parking Lots

File #: 18-383

The City of Merced owns four parking facilities within one-block of the Merced Center Garage (See Figure 1). Three of the four parking lots are available to the public. Parking Lot #15 is dedicated to City of Merced employee parking. The following public parking lots are available to serve businesses and organizations located near the Downtown Campus Center:

Parking Lot #3	57 spaces	Time restricted
Parking Lot #4	46 spaces	Time restricted
Parking Lot #15	41 spaces	City employee use
Shannon Parcade	146 spaces	Open from 6am to 10pm.



The key mission of the Downtown Parking Plan is to provide plentiful parking to downtown customers and visitors. Staff will continue monitoring parking patterns in the adjacent lots and recommend changes as necessary.

Forthcoming Downtown Development

Two of three exciting downtown projects are in close proximity to the Merced Center Garage and Downtown Campus Center including the El Capitan Hotel Renovation, Hotel Tioga, and upcoming Mainzer Theatre improvement. With these projects in mind and other anticipated Downtown Merced projects, there will be greater pressure on nearby parking resources. Staff is reaching out to two consultants, soliciting proposals to assist the City with providing more parking opportunities for customers, visitors, and residents.

IMPACT ON CITY RESOURCES

No impact on the General Fund. The Parking Authority Fund is responsible for upfront cost such as posting or painting signs where the UC Merced employees will park, followed by regular maintenance. With the exception of the start-up period, the Parking Authority Fund may realize \$70,500 annually should the Council approve the Agreement with the Regents.

FACILITY USE AGREEMENT

THE REGENTS AS LICENSEE

THIS AGREEMENT dated ______, 2018, ("effective Date") is by and between PARKING AUTHORITY OF THE CITY OF MERCED, a parking authority created pursuant to Street and Highways Code Section 32500 et seq ("Authority") and THE REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF CALIFORNIA, on behalf of its Merced campus ("University").

WHEREAS, University constructed a 67,000 square-foot office also known as the Downtown Campus Center and intends to employ up to 400 in its Downtown facility;

WHEREAS, Said University Downtown Campus Center is located on the project site once known as the Merced Center Hotel and Conference Center site;

WHEREAS, the Merced Center Garage was constructed for the purpose of providing leased parking to the Merced Center Hotel and Conference Center project which is now the Downtown Campus Center;

WHEREAS, Authority is the owner of certain real property described as follows:

Merced Center Parking Garage located in Merced, CA, bordered by M Street, 18th Street, and 19th Street, as shown on the map attached hereto as Exhibit A("Premises"); and

WHEREAS, University seeks to enter and use a portion of the Premises as follows: 100 dedicated covered parking spaces on the Second Level and 25 non-covered parking spaces on the Third Level as indicated on the maps attached hereto as Exhibits A, B, and C.

NOW, THEREFORE, Authority and University hereby agree as follows:

ARTICLE 1 - GRANT OF LICENSE

1.1 Authority hereby grants the University and to its agents, employees, guest and invitees an exclusive, revocable license to enter and use the Premises for the purpose, and at the times, set forth in Article 3, below.

ARTICLE 2 - TERM

2.1 The term of this Agreement shall be for the period from August 1, 2018 to December 31, 2023 ("Term").

ARTICLE 3 -- USE OF PREMISES

<u>3.1</u> University Use. The University shall use the Premises as parking for University employees. 59

3.2 Time of Use. The University's use of the Premises shall be limited to Monday through Friday, from 6:00am to 7:00pm., with exceptions for those employees working past 7:00 pm. Weekend parking will be allowed, depending on availability.

3.3 Park Only. The leased parking spaces granted by Authority to University under this Agreement are a non-exclusive license to park only, and shall be used solely by University for the parking of motor vehicles by its employees in the parking facilities identified in the this Agreement, under the terms, conditions, and obligations herein and in accordance with the rules and regulations posted at the parking facilities.

3.4 Identification. Authority shall provide signage or markings for parking spaces leased by University. University shall provide parking hangers for its employees, and University employees shall display the parking hanger on their vehicle rear view mirror to designate that the vehicle is authorized to park within the respective parking facilities.

3.5 No Parking in Ralph Shannon Parcade. University shall prohibit its employees to park at the Ralph Shannon Parcade located at 626 18th Street, and shall take reasonable steps to advise its employees not to park at the Ralph Shannon Parcade.

ARTICLE 4 - CONSIDERATION

4.1 Pay Period. Under this Agreement, the Pay Period shall be from August 1, 2018 to December 31, 2023 ("Pay Period"). University shall pay Authority in advance the amounts specified below prior to the first day of each quarter (January, April, July, and October): Fifty Dollars (\$50) per month for each covered parking space and Thirty-Five Dollars (\$35) per month for each non-covered parking space.

ARTICLE 5 – NOTICES

5.1 All notices to be addressed by University to Authority in connection with this Agreement shall be given writing to Authority at:

ARTICLE 6 - TERMINATION

6.1 Either Party to this Agreement may terminate this Agreement by proving at least ninety (90) days, written notice to the other Party, unless otherwise agreed to in writing by the Parties.

6.2 In the event that the Premises are damaged from any cause rendering the parking facilities totally or partially inaccessible or unusable during the Term of this Agreement as reasonably determined by Authority, Authority may terminate this Agreement by giving University seven (7) days written notice thereof.

6.3 In the event that University fails to perform any terms, conditions, or obligations under this Agreement, in addition to all other remedies provided by law, Authority may terminate this Agreement immediately upon written notice to University.

6.4 The Director of Economic Development is empowered to terminate this Agreement on behalf of Authority.

6.5 No right or remedy herein conferred upon or reserved to City is intended to be exclusive of any other right or remedy, and each and every right and remedy shall be cumulative and in addition to any other right or remedy given hereunder or now or hereafter existing at law or in equity or by statute.

6.6 Upon expiration or earlier termination of this Agreement, University shall surrender all rights to use the parking facilities granted by this Agreement.

ARTICLE 7 - PARKING RULES AND REGULATIONS

7.1 In its use of the parking facilities, University shall at all times comply, and shall cause its employees to comply, with any rules and regulations established by Authority ("Rules"). Authority may unilaterally modify or amend such Rules from time to time.

ARTICLE 8 - INDEMNITY AND HOLD HARMLESS

8.1 <u>Authority</u> shall indemnify, defend and hold harmless University, its officers, agents, and employees from and against any claims, damages, costs, expenses, or liabilities (collectively "Claims") arising out of or in any way connected with this License including, without limitation, Claims for loss or damage to any property, or for death or injury to any person or persons, but only in proportion to and to the extent that such Claims arise from the negligent or wrongful acts or omissions of Authority, its officers, partners, agents, or employees.

8.2 <u>University</u> shall indemnify, defend and hold harmless Authority, its officers, partners, agents, and employees from and against any Claims arising out of or in any way connected with this License including, without limitation, Claims for loss or damage to any property or for death or injury to any person or persons, but only in proportion to and to the extent that such Claims arise from the negligent or wrongful acts or omissions of University, its officers, agents, or employees.

ARTICLE 9 – INSURANCE

9.1 University, at its sole cost and expense, shall insure its activities in connection with this Agreement and obtain, keep in force and maintain insurance as follows:

a. General Liability Self-Insurance Program (contractual liability included) with minimum limits as follows:

1.	Each Occurrence	\$ 1,000,000
2.	Products/Completed Operations	Aggregate \$ 2,000,000
3.	Personal and Advertising Injury	\$ 1,000,000
4.	General Aggregate	\$ 2,000,000

- b. Business Automobile Liability Self-Insurance Program for owned, non-owned, or hired automobiles with a combined single limit of not less than one million dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence.
- c. Property, Fire and Extended Coverage Self-Insurance Program in an amount sufficient to reimburse Authority for all of its equipment, trade fixtures, inventory, fixtures and other personal property located on or in the Premises including leasehold improvements hereinafter constructed or installed.
- d. Workers' Compensation as required by California law.

The coverages referred to under a. and b. of this Section 9.1 shall include Authority as an additional insured. Such a provision shall apply only in proportion to and to the extent of the negligent acts or omissions of University, its officers, agents, employees, volunteers or invitees. University, upon the execution of this License, shall furnish Authority with certificates of insurance evidencing compliance with all requirements. Certificates shall provide for thirty (30)

days advance written notice to the Authority of any material modification, change or cancellation of any of the above insurance coverages.

The coverages required herein shall not limit the liability of University.

ARTICLE 10 - WAIVER OF SUBROGATION

10.1 Authority and University and all parties claiming under or through them hereby mutually release and discharge each other and the officers, employees, agents, representatives, customers, and business visitors of Authority or University from all claims, losses, and liabilities arising from or caused by any hazard covered by insurance on or in connection with the Premises, even if caused by the fault or negligence of a released party. This release shall apply only to the extent that such claim, loss, or liability is covered by insurance.

ARTICLE 11 - EXTERIOR SIGNS

11.1 Any and all signs or advertisements of any nature extending into, on, or located over the Premises, shall conform to all City of Merced zoning and building codes and shall be approved by Authority in writing prior to construction, use, or erection thereof. Approval by Authority shall not be unreasonably withheld, conditioned or delayed, as to location, graphics, type, content, and architectural or engineering standards.

ARTICLE 12 - COVENANTS AGAINST DISCRIMINATION

12.1 Both Authority and University agree for itself, its heirs, executors, administrators, and assigns, and all persons claiming under or through them, as follows:

"There shall be no discrimination against or segregation of any person or group of persons on account of race, color creed, national origin, religion, sex, disability, marital status, or ancestry, in the leasing, subleasing, transferring, use, occupancy, tenure, or enjoyment of the Premises herein granted, nor shall University, or any person claiming under or through it, establish or permit any such practice or practices of discrimination or segregation with reference to the selection, location, number, use, occupancy of tenants, lessees, sublessees, subtenants or vendees in the Premises herein granted."

ARTICLE 13 - WAIVER

13.1 Authority's failure to enforce any breach of any term, covenant or condition contained herein shall not be deemed to be a waiver of such terms, covenants or conditions, or any subsequent breach of same, or any other term, covenant or condition contained herein.

ARTICLE 14 - ASSIGNMENT OR TRANSFER

14.1 This Agreement or the right to use any parking facility may not be assigned or transferred by University by voluntary act or otherwise without the Authority's prior written consent. Any attempted assignment or other transfer of this Agreement in violation of this Section shall be void.

ARTICLE 15 - GOVERNING LAW

15.1 The law governing this Agreement shall be that of the State of California.

ARTICLE 16 - VENUE

16.1 The Parties hereto agree that any and all lawsuits or legal proceedings relating to this Agreement, its interpretation or the Parties 'performance of this Agreement, shall take place in Merced County Superior Court.

ARTICLE 17 – ATTORNEY'S FEES

17.1 If either Party to this Agreement brings an action to enforce the terms of this Agreement or to declare rights hereunder, the substantially prevailing party in any such action, on trial or appeal, shall be awarded its reasonable attorney's fees to be paid by the substantially losing party as fixed by the Court.

ARTICLE 18 - ENTIRE AGREEMENT

18.1 This Agreement contains the entire agreement and understanding between the parties and supersedes all prior written or oral agreements with respect to the subject matter herein. No representation, warranty, condition, or agreement of any kind or nature whatsoever shall be binding upon the parties hereto unless incorporated in this Agreement. This Agreement may be modified only by a written Amendment signed by both Licensee and University.


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

SUBJECT: <u>City-Owned Real Property Request #18-11 for Use of Bob Hart Square (Merced</u> <u>Center for the Performing Arts and Playhouse Merced</u>)

REPORT IN BRIEF

Consider allowing the use of Bob Hart Square from 8:00 a.m. to 11:30 p.m. on Saturday, August 18, 2018, by Playhouse Merced for the Playhouse Merced 2018 Gala and fundraising dinner (including the serving of alcohol).

RECOMMENDATION

City Council - Adopt a motion approving the use of Bob Hart Square from 8:00 a.m. to 11:30 p.m. on Saturday, August 18, 2018, for a fundraiser gala and dinner, to include the serving of alcohol; subject to the conditions outlined in the administrative staff report.

ALTERNATIVES

- 1. Approve, as recommended by staff; or,
- 2. Approve, with modifications; or,
- 3. Deny the request completely; or,
- 4. Refer to staff for reconsideration of specific items as requested by Council; or,
- 5. Continue to a future City Council meeting (date and time to be specified in the motion).

AUTHORITY

Merced Municipal Code, Section 9.12.020 - Serving or drinking liquors on street:

"It is unlawful, and a misdemeanor, subject to punishment in accordance with Chapter 1.12 of the Code, for any person to serve, drink, consume, or have in his/her possession an open container containing any spirituous, vinous, malt, or any other intoxicating liquors in or upon any of the streets, sidewalks, alleys, parking lots, or any public place in the city, unless otherwise permitted by the Merced Municipal Code or authorized by the city council."

CITY COUNCIL PRIORITIES

Not applicable.

DISCUSSION

Background

Each year, Playhouse Merced holds a major fundraiser dinner in Bob Hart Square, which includes fine dining provided by Five Ten Bistro and live on-stage entertainment by Playhouse Merced's favorite local stars.

Description

The Merced Center for the Performing Arts (MCPA) and Playhouse Merced are requesting the use of Bob Hart Square, located at the intersection of W. Main and Canal Streets, for this year's annual gala fundraiser (Attachment 1).

The gala event is scheduled to begin on Saturday, August 18, 2018, at 6:00 p.m. and the last guest is expected to leave by 11:00 p.m. However, to allow for the construction and take-down of the stage and lighting and the dining area, the use of the park is requested from 8:00 a.m. to 12:00 a.m. the next morning (Sunday, August 19, 2018).

Included in the site plan for the event will be a stage and backstage area, a full beer/wine/liquor bar, a check-in station, and 40 dinner tables (8 chairs per table), with the entire area surrounded by fencing (Attachment 2).

At the eastern and northeastern perimeter of the event, the applicants will use 4-foot-high screened temporary cyclone fencing, and the northern side of the park will utilize the City's existing wroughtiron perimeter fencing. The wide, easternmost walkway immediately adjacent to Destino's restaurant and retail/office spaces alongside the park will remain open for non-attendee pedestrians passing from W. Main to W. 16th Streets and the parking lots.

Security Personnel will be posted at each entrance/exit in the perimeter fencing, with the main intake being at the southeastern corner of the event area nearest the parking lots at West 16th and Canal Streets, where most guests are expected to park. The applicant will also have "floating" security guards inside the event. The applicant expects approximately 320 guests to attend the event. The Police Department requires security at a minimum of one security personnel per fifty attendees (Condition #8).

Amplified music and loudspeaker activity will end at approximately 10:00 p.m., in respect of the nearby residential lofts (Condition #15).

Serving of Alcoholic Beverages in City Parks

Alcohol service will be provided by the Playhouse Merced, to include beer, wine, and liquor specialty drinks. A temporary one-day event alcohol license (Type 77 or suitable) shall be obtained through the California Bureau of Alcohol Control (ABC) by the applicant and a copy provided to Planning staff prior to the event (Condition #14)

The "floating" and entrance/exit security guards will be patrolling through the area during the event to ensure that the requirements of the ABC alcohol permit are in compliance with regards to underage drinking and that no alcohol beverages are carried past the perimeter fence.

The applicants' request to use the park must be reviewed and approved by the City Council, per Merced Municipal Code (MMC) 9.12.020, which requires Council authorization for any alcohol served in any City park or public place (see full Code Section noted above under "Authority").

Conditions of Approval

1. Event Sponsor shall indemnify, protect, defend, (with counsel selected by the City) save and hold City, its officers, employees, agents, and volunteers harmless from any and all claims or causes of action for death or injury to persons, or damage to property resulting from intentional or negligent acts, errors, or omissions of Event Sponsor or Event Sponsor's officers, employees, agents, volunteers, and participants during performance of the Event, or from any violation of any federal, state, or municipal law or ordinance, to the extent caused, in whole or in part, by the willful misconduct, negligent acts, or omissions of Event Sponsor or its officers, employees, agents, volunteers, or participants, or resulting from the negligence of the City, its officers, employees, agents, volunteers, except for loss caused solely by the gross negligence of the city. Acceptance by City of insurance certificates and endorsements required for this Event does not relive Event Sponsor from liability under this indemnification and hold harmless cause. This indemnification and hold harmless clause shall apply to any damages or claims for damages whether or not such insurance policies shall have been determined to apply.

2. Prior to engaging in the event, Event Sponsor shall complete and file with the City a special events, general liability and automobile policy of at least \$500,000 combined limit for bodily injury and property damage which covers the entire event. Said policy shall stipulate that this insurance will operate as primary insurance and that no other insurance will be called on to cover a loss covered thereunder. Additional insured endorsements evidencing this special events, general liability and automobile coverage, naming the City and its officers, agents, and employees as additional insureds, must be submitted to the City prior to the event. This certificate shall provide that thirty (30) days written notice of cancellation shall be given to the City.

3. Event staff and attendees shall use the large parking lots along W. 16th Street between W. Main and W. 16th Streets. Attendees shall be instructed not to use parking along W. Main Street for the evening, in order to avoid adverse impact to businesses and other downtown patrons.

4. Event Sponsor shall remove all structures, debris, and any other event-generated items from the park and surrounding gutters and sidewalks prior to 11:30 p.m. on the night of the event.

5. if needed, Event Sponsor shall be responsible for making arrangements with the City's Public Works Refuse Department's staff to deliver and remove curbside refuse containers for use during the event and for any necessary cleanup afterwards.

6. Event Sponsor shall comply with all applicable statutes, ordinances, rules, regulations, etc., including all regulations of the City of Merced Fire Department, including obtaining permit(s) for any tents or canopies used for the event.

7. All provisions of the Fire Code shall apply. This includes, but is not limited to, posting no-smoking signs in any tented areas as required, no parking within twenty (20) feet of any tent, all requirements

for any cooking in a tent, and including any temporary and portable electrical power supplies that may be used.

8. Event Sponsor shall provide adequate supervision and security throughout the area to ensure the safety of the participants and the public, as required by the Merced Police Department. At minimum, security guards shall be provided at one officer per fifty (50) attendees, or a minimum of seven guards.

9. Event Sponsor and its caterer shall comply with all requirements of the Merced County Health Department with regards to the serving of food and drink.

10. Event Sponsor shall ensure that any independent vendors and services, such as DJ's, portable toilet rental companies, photo booth vendors, bartenders, and caterers, obtain or hold current business licenses within the City of Merced.

11. Event Sponsor shall be responsible for making timely arrangements with the City's Public Works staff to turn on and off the electrical power supply in the park before and after the event.

12. Any temporary modifications of the City's electrical system in the park shall be approved by City staff. Only a State-licensed electrician shall be permitted to make any such modifications. All modifications shall be completely removed and reverted back to the original system after the event.

13. The Event Sponsor shall provide access to disabled-accessible restrooms, as required by the California Building Code.

14. Alcoholic beverages may be served during this event, subject to the strict rules, regulations, and restrictions of the California Alcohol Beverage Control (ABC). A temporary one-day event alcohol license (Type 77 or suitable) shall be obtained by the applicant and a copy provided to Planning staff prior to the start of the event.

15. Noise from music and other activities shall be kept to a minimum, so as not to disturb the nearby residential loft units. Music shall not be played later than 10:00 p.m.

16. As the applicant has indicated that the Five Ten Bistro Restaurant's regular alley service refuse bins will be utilized for any solid waste generated by the event, thus eliminating the need for additional containers, it shall be the applicant's responsibility to ensure that the restaurant properly disposes of said waste. Any resulting overflow of the restaurant's refuse bins shall be transferred to the applicant's own alley service refuse bins, so as to keep the alleyway clean.

IMPACT ON CITY RESOURCES

No appropriation of funds is necessary.

A small impact to Public Works' Facilities staff is expected, such as staff time in arranging for and turning on electricity in the park to make it available to the event's power needs, along with general park cleanup the day before.



The event organizers will be required to leave the park cleaned of any trash and debris it generates. Five Ten Bistro Restaurant will place any such trash and debris in their existing City-service container, so additional refuse bins for the event are not necessary (Condition #16).

There is no expected impact to City Police resources, as the applicants will be providing their own security. No other City resource impacts are expected.



SUBJECT: Agreement with the Merced Irrigation District for Well Site 20 Storm Water Discharge to Hartley Canal, Project No. 107033

REPORT IN BRIEF

Authorizes an agreement with the Merced Irrigation District (MID) to discharge storm water from the new Well 20 pump station site to the adjacent Hartley Canal.

RECOMMENDATION

City Council - Adopt a motion:

A. Approving a water drainage agreement with the Merced Irrigation District and payment of the associated fees; and,

B. Approving an amendment to an Agreement for Professional Services with Luhdorff and Scalmanini Consulting Engineers Inc., in the amount of \$32,440 for engineering design services; and,

C. Authorizing the City Manager or Assistant City Manager to execute the necessary documents.

ALTERNATIVES

- 1. Approve, as recommended by staff; or,
- 2. Approve, subject to modifications as conditioned by City Council; or,
- 3. Refer to staff for reconsideration of specific items; or,

AUTHORITY

CITY COUNCIL PRIORITIES

As provided for in the 2018-19 Adopted Budget.

DISCUSSION

The City Engineer and Public Works Director previously recommended that a new water well, Well 20, be located at the proposed Community Park 42 (CP-42) site. The CP-42 site is located on the southeast boundary of the City at the intersection of Tyler Road and Mission Avenue. The new well was installed and staff proceeded to develop plans and specifications for the new pump station to

connect to the existing water system. The plans include surface asphalt paving and associated valley gutters to collect and drain precipitation at the site.

Merced Irrigation District Drainage Agreement

There are no City storm water service mains (piping) in the location of the new pump station. Therefore, staff applied to the Merced Irrigation District (MID) for a water discharge permit to dispose of collected storm water into their Hartley Slough facility (canal) located immediately adjacent to the subject site. It was also intended to occasionally dispose of well "pump to waste water" (also termed well "start-up water"). After evaluation of the canal's ability to accept a new water source, MID informed the City that its capacity was limited and discharge of water would need to be restricted to 350 gallons per minute. They forwarded an acceptable draft agreement that requires the City to first pump the site's water into a holding basin, and then limit the pumping of discharge water from the basin to the canal at the above referenced 350 gallons per minute.

The MID agreement under consideration includes the following fees:

Luhdorff and Scalmanini Consulting Engineers Contract Amendment

The City awarded an agreement for professional services with Luhdorff and Scalmanini Consulting Engineers to design the pump station. Their original contract included provisions for designing either a storm water collection basin at the site, or discharge to MID's Hartley Slough canal.

The City requested modifications to the pump station design that included:

- Evaluating and responding to the changes in design necessitated by the proposed MID drainage agreement outlined above;
- Changes to the size of the proposed storm water basin to accommodate the additional use as a full-size adult soccer field for the proposed park at the request of the Recreation Department;
- Changes to the proposed basin construction to account for clayey soils at the site and associated poor water percolation.

The Luhdorff and Scalmanini Consulting Engineers contract amendment under consideration includes costs associated with the above design changes. Staff will direct Luhdorff and Scalmanini Consulting Engineers to incorporate the design changes upon adoption by the City Council. The final project plans and specifications will be routed to MID for approval, and then staff will proceed to bidding the pump station construction.

History and Past Actions

On January 3, 2012, the City Council adopted the Merced Vision 2030 General Plan. Chapter 5, Section 5.2.3 of the Merced Vision 2030 General Plan includes the following provision- *"Through the Capital Improvement Program, the City plans to increase water wells to match the requirements of development, generally one well per square mile."*

On August 5, 2013, the City Council authorized the acquisition of 0.43 acres of land from City Park CP-42 for Well Site 20. The 0.43 acre well site comprises approximately 1% of the 38.9 acre park property and will not result in any loss of park recreational space.

On April 20, 2015, the City Council awarded a professional services agreement with Luhdorff & Scalmanini Consulting Engineers for engineering design services at the Well 20 site.

On December 21, 2015, the City Council awarded a contract to Nor-Cal Pump and Well Drilling to install the new Well 20.


On December 18, 2017, the City Council approved a modification to the CP-42 property agricultural lease (reduction in size) to accommodate the proposed storm water basin.

IMPACT ON CITY RESOURCES

This project was established as a Capital Improvement Project and account 556-1118-637.65-00-107033 contains sufficient funding to complete the project.




LOCATION MAP

DRAINAGE AGREEMENT

18-502 Well Site 20

This Agreement is entered into between MERCED IRRIGATION DISTRICT for MERCED IRRIGATION DRAINAGE IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT No. 1 (hereafter "District"), and the City of Merced, a political subdivision of the State of California, hereinafter referred to as "City", whose address is City of Merced Engineering Department, 678 West 18th Street, Merced, CA 95340 (hereafter "City").

RECITALS

WHEREAS, pursuant to California Water Code 22981, the District has formed a California Drainage District known as Merced Irrigation District Drainage Improvement District No. 1; and

WHEREAS, the District has certain canals, laterals, pumps, wells, gates, valves, rightsof-way, easements, fee property and other tangible and intangible interests and facilities for the distribution of water (herein collectively "facilities" of District); and

WHEREAS, City is vested in fee certain real property (hereafter the "Property") legally described in Exhibit "A" and shown on Exhibit "B" attached hereto and incorporated herein by this reference; and

WHEREAS, City desires to develop a potable well for the City's water system and plans to construct a basin that will receive well start-up water; and

WHEREA, City desires to use certain facilities of the District to discharge from and drain said water basin as necessary; and

WHEREAS, certain facilities of the District are physically capable to accommodate City's desire to discharge from said basin; and

WHEREAS, development by City using District facilities to accept discharge from said basin expands, modifies, creates and enlarges facilities; or adds, expands, modifies, creates or enlarges burdens, obligations and/or responsibilities of the District.

THEREFORE, IT IS AGREED AS FOLLOWS:

AGREEMENT

1. <u>Recitals</u>. The recitals set forth above are hereby incorporated and made an operative part of this Agreement.

2. <u>Real Property Being Developed</u>. City plans to develop the Property for well pump station and basin, the real property being as set forth on Exhibit "A" attached hereto and incorporated herein, hereinafter "Property."

3. <u>Modification of District Facilities.</u> City's development will drain through the Districts Hartley Lateral an existing District Facility, to the Hartley Slough as it is currently used.

4. <u>Drainage Request</u>. City specifically requests and asks the District to provide the Property with the ability to pump from said storm drain basin using facilities of the District.

5. <u>Consent of District</u>. The District consents and agrees to receive the storm drain basin discharge of said property to the facilities as hereinafter set forth, subject to all terms and conditions of this Agreement.

6. <u>Work of City</u>. City agrees to install, at City's sole cost and expense, the drainage improvements to the Property.

7. <u>Urban Encroachment Fee.</u> City agrees to pay to the District a non-refundable sum of TWO THOUSAND AND 00/100 DOLLARS (\$2,000.00) for the engineering and administrative costs associated with the preparation and filing of this agreement.

8. Annual Maintenance Fees.

a. City consents to the collection of the annual assessment of \$507.00 on City's annual Merced Irrigation District Drainage Improvement District No. 1 statement. Said amount shall constitute a lien on the property until paid.

9. <u>Limitations of Drainage Area</u>. Drainage area is specifically restricted to the described property in Exhibit "A" and shown on Exhibit "B" herein.

10. <u>Limitations on Discharge</u>. In consideration of the consent of District to permit the discharge of waters from said storm water basin into the facilities of the District. City agrees that at no time shall the rate of discharge into facilities of the District exceed 350 gallons per minute (GPM).

11. <u>Changes</u>. No modification, change, or alteration of the facilities of the District or to the planned drainage method, facilities, plans or the rate and manner of drainage set forth herein, will be made by City without the specific written approval and consent of District first had and received.

12. <u>Failure to Make Payments - Lien on Property</u>. Failure of City to make any payments, under paragraphs 7 and/or 8, when due to the District as specified in this Agreement shall become a lien upon the real property subject hereto. Should said property be subdivided into other lawful parcels at the time of non-payment, said lien will attach to the non-paying parcel.

13. <u>Drainage Defined</u>. Drainage as used herein includes only domestic drainage. Such consent shall be conditioned, as a minimum, upon a satisfactory water report of the quality of said water prior to discharge.

14. <u>Injunctions/Remedies</u>. In the event City is in breach of any aspect of this Agreement, the District may cause all discharge into the facilities of the District to terminate, and may seek and obtain through appropriate court action an injunction precluding all further use of facilities of the District for the purpose herein set forth. This remedy is in addition to any and all other remedies the District may have in law or equity and in addition to any damages to which the District from the property subject hereto. In the event the District establishes a wrongful discharge of water or breach of this Agreement, District shall be entitled to damages in an amount according to proof.

15. <u>Storm Drainage Hook-Up Fee</u>. This project lies completely within the boundaries of that certain Drainage District known as Drainage Improvement District No. 1 in which the District requires a Storm Drainage Hook-Up Fee. MID and the City agree to a Storm Drainage Hook-Up Fee of EIGHT THOUSAND FOUR HUNDRED AND FIFY TWO AND 00/100 DOLLARS (\$8,452.00).

16. <u>Liability for Hazardous Discharge</u>. No discharge of waters into the facilities of the District shall occur, which discharges are not environmentally safe and harmless to flora and fauna as determined by the District. All discharges of water effluent or materials of any nature into facilities of the District by City shall be of a purity certified and approved as safe for such discharge, as water purity standards are established by the Environmental Protection Agency of the United States of America, the State of California, the County of Merced, the City of Merced, and the District. All discharges shall be free and clear of chlorine, noxious odor and particulate matter other than as satisfies the applicable quality standards. In addition to having purity sufficient for discharge, such discharges shall be safe and non-deleterious to any agrarian or husbandry use.

17. <u>Pumping Charges and Costs</u>. In connection with any reservoir impounding of start-up water for the purposes of regulation prior to discharge into facilities of the District, City shall be entirely responsible for any and all costs of installing said pump, its maintenance, power charges, and repair.

18. <u>Hold Harmless</u>. City agrees to indemnify and to hold the District free, clear and harmless from and against any and all and every form of liability, claim, suit or action of every kind, name or description whatsoever asserted or brought against the Merced Irrigation District or the Drainage District for or on account of any injuries to real or personal property or injuries or death sustained to any person or persons caused or arising out of this Agreement, the drainage activities, discharge, impounding or flooding as a result of this drainage agreement.

19. <u>City Groundwater Well, Storm Drain Basin and Drainage Discharge</u>. District is not responsible for the design and/or construction of any component of the City's proposed facilities. City shall incorporate MID's standard details associated with storm water discharges into their design and submit drawings for MID's review and approval regarding incorporation of said storm drainage details.

20. <u>Maintenance Requirement of Ditches, Fences</u>. City shall be responsible for the specific maintenance and repair of the Property, any impound facilities, discharge facilities, and fences or other safety measures connected therewith.

21. <u>Title to Improvements</u>. All improvements placed in fee title, easements, rights-of-way, or other title properties of District by City pursuant to this Agreement and for the use and benefit of District shall, upon acceptance thereof by the District, become the property of District, and City shall have no claim thereon.

22. <u>Severability</u>. It is intended that each paragraph of this Agreement shall be viewed as separate and divisible, and in the event that any paragraph shall be held to be invalid, the remaining paragraphs shall continue to be in full force and effect.

23. <u>Attorney's Fees</u>. Should any litigation be commenced between the parties to this Agreement concerning this Agreement or the rights and duties of either in relation thereto, the party prevailing in such litigation shall be entitled, in addition to such other relief as may be granted in the litigation, to a reasonable sum as and for his attorney's fees in such litigation or in a separate action brought for that purpose.

24. <u>Successors and Assigns</u>. This Agreement shall be binding on and shall inure to the benefit of the heirs, executors, administrators, successors and assigns of the parties hereto, and shall run with the land.

25. <u>Notices</u>. Except as otherwise expressly provided by law, any and all notices or other communications required or permitted by this Agreement or by law to be served on or given to any party hereto by any other party hereto shall be in writing and shall be deemed duly served and given when personally delivered to the party to whom they are directed, or in lieu of such personal service, when deposited in the United States mail, first class postage prepaid, addressed as follows:

26. <u>Governing Law</u>. This Agreement and all matters relating to the Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of California in force at the time any need for interpretation of this Agreement or any decisions or holding concerning this Agreement arises.

27. <u>Amendments</u>. This Agreement may be amended only by a writing signed by all of the parties to this Agreement.

28. <u>Titles</u>. The titles of paragraphs of this Agreement are solely for the convenience of the parties, and are not part of the Agreement.







Per your request this letter provides an amendment to the scope of work for engineering services associated with the design of the City of Merced Well #20 Pump Station facility. Luhdorff and Scalmanini, Consulting Engineers (LSCE) prepared this proposed Contract Amendment #2 to account for specific items requested by the City, as indicated in this letter.

MODIFICATIONS TO SCOPE OF WORK

This Contract Amendment #2 is related to LSCE's design task for the pump station facility: Task 2.2 - Plans and Specifications for Pump Station included in our November 2013 proposal for engineering design services. The following items as instructed by the City are included in Contract Amendment #2.

Required MID design changes: In an email on 5/25/18 the City informed LSCE of required design changes to comply with the agreement between with the Merced Irrigation District (MID) and the City for discharges to the canal. In summary, the changes will limit discharges from the drainage basin to the canal to 350 gallons per minute and will eliminate the ability to pump directly from the well to the canal. There was no need for a canal level probe on or offsite. LSCE's scope for design changes encompasses the following activities:

- Incorporate required MID design changes as instructed by the City.
- Submit hard copies of plans and specifications, denoted as the 101% deliverable.
- Meet with the City and MID to review comments or changes to the design.
- Prepare the final design that incorporates City and MID comments for bidding.

Credit to City for MID design standards: LSCE's prior 100% design deliverable to the City did not include the official MID design standards, as required per contract. In the forthcoming 101% deliverable, LSCE will obtain and implement the official MID design standards at no charge to the City.

Prior cost overruns: LSCE's budget memorandum on November 20, 2017 described a budget shortfall from out-of-scope items related to well modifications and design of the wet well pump system to address low percolating soils observed in the soccer field/drainage basin.



In June 2013, the City Council authorized the transfer of a portion of the southeast corner to the Water Department for Well Site 20 and has since then leased the remaining portion of the property to Seth Rossow for agricultural use.

With the construction of Well Site 20, staff was approached by Merced Irrigation District (MID) to



DISCUSSION

The County of Merced (County) has finished constructing the new Behavioral Health and Recovery Services Main Campus at the former Mercy Medical Center, located at 301 E. 13th Street. The project is located between 13th Street and 15th Street near D Street. The area is frequented by transients and has an elevated vandalism rate. To reduce vandalism and to better protect the public using the facility, the County of Merced proposed to construct a wrought-iron fence in the City right-of-way.

The County approached staff in March 2018, requesting permission to go forth with installing the fence, landscape, and the irrigation to avoid delays and additional cost for construction. After

discussion with staff, it was agreed to allow the County to construct the fence along with landscape and irrigation subject to City Council approval.

On May 8, 2018, the Agreement was approved by the County Board of Supervisors. The County has provided the necessary insurance requirement and the Agreement is now subject to City Council approval.

IMPACT ON CITY RESOURCES

No appropriation of funds is needed.

AGREEMENT FOR USE OF CITY RIGHT-OF-WAY

THIS AGREEMENT FOR USE OF CITY RIGHT-OF-WAY ("Agreement") is made this _____ day of _____, 2018, by and between COUNTY OF MERCED, a political subdivision of the State of California ("Owner") and the CITY OF MERCED, a California Charter Municipal Corporation ("City"). Owner and City are sometimes referred to collectively herein as the "Parties" and individually as a "Party."

<u>RECITALS:</u>

The following recitals are a substantive portion of this Agreement:

A. Owner holds fee title to the real property at and commonly known as <u>200 East 13th Street</u> Merced, California, APN <u>035-010-005</u> and more specifically described on the attached <u>Exhibit "A"</u> (the "**Property**").

B. City holds a <u>80' Right-of-Way</u> as described on the attached <u>Exhibit</u> <u>"B"</u> (the "Easement").

C. Owner desires to construct and maintain certain improvements within the City Right-of-Way, including a 4' high fence, landscape and irrigation (the "Improvements").

NOW, THEREFORE, in furtherance of the foregoing Recitals, and for good and valuable consideration, the receipt and adequacy of which are hereby acknowledged, Owner and City hereby agree as follows:

1. <u>Grant of Right and Nature of Agreement</u>. City grants Owner the right to construct and maintain the Improvements within the City Easement, as set forth more specifically in <u>Exhibit "C"</u> attached hereto. In so doing, and notwithstanding anything to the contrary in this Agreement, or pursuant to the course of dealings between the Parties, City expressly does not and shall not abandon the Easement or waive any rights thereunder, and Owner, its heirs, successors, and assigns derive no basis for a claim of prescriptive, contractual, or other rights to utilize the City Right-of-Way except as expressly provided herein. This grant of permission is limited to Owner constructing, maintaining and using the Improvements in the City Right-of-Way, and does not constitute a deed or grant of any other real property interest by City.

2. Use of the City Right-of-Way; Cessation of Interference. This grant of permission shall be subject to and subordinate to the prior continuing right of City to use the City Right-of-Way for the public services described in Exhibit "B". Any construction, maintenance or use of the Improvements (or of any further Improvements approved by City) shall not interfere with City's use of the City Right-of-Way. If at any time, City reasonably believes that Owner's construction, maintenance or use of the Improvements interferes with City's use of the City Right-of-Way as specified herein, City shall provide written notice to Owner of such interference. Owner shall work with City and remedy such interference by ceasing the interfering activities or removing or repairing the particular Improvements causing such interference within thirty (30) days of receipt of City's notice, unless such remedy takes longer than thirty (30) days in which case Owner shall commence such remedy within thirty (30) days and diligently prosecute it to completion. If Owner fails to remedy such interference as provided herein, City may (a) take steps to remedy the interference and Owner shall reimburse City's reasonable expenses for taking such steps within thirty (30) days of receipt of City's invoice for such expenses, or (b) terminate this Agreement on thirty (30) days' advance written notice. Upon termination of this Agreement, Owner shall remove all Improvements from the Easement and restore the Property to its natural state as it existed prior to the installation of Improvements by Owner.

3. <u>Damage to the Right-of-Way</u>. Owner shall be solely responsible for any damage Owner or its employees, representatives or contractors cause

to City streets, sidewalks, curbs, utilities, or other City owned property due to the installation, maintenance, repair, or removal of Owner's Improvements in the City Right-of-Way, and shall repair, replace, and restore in kind the said damaged facilities at its sole expense.

4. <u>Owner's Maintenance of Improvements</u>. Owner shall be solely responsible for any maintenance and/or repairs to the Improvements except maintenance or repairs necessary due to damage caused solely by City or its employees, representatives or contractors. Owner shall maintain the Improvements and surrounding area in good and safe condition and free from damage, to the reasonable satisfaction of City.

6. <u>Hazardous Materials</u>. Owner agrees that Owner shall not bring onto the City Right-of-Way, or store or dispose of on the City Right-of-Way, nor knowingly allow others to bring onto, store or dispose on the City Right-of-Way, any hazardous material of any kind. Notwithstanding the foregoing, Owner may store or use standard business materials normally used in Owner's type of business, in compliance with all laws, regulations, statutes, ordinances and codes.

7. <u>Insurance Requirements</u>. Owner shall maintain a Commercial General Liability insurance policy against claims and liabilities for personal injury, death, or property damage providing protection in the minimum amount of: one million dollars (\$1,000,000.00) for bodily injury or death to any one person for any one accident or occurrence and at least one million dollars (\$1,000,000.00) for property damage.

7.1 City, its officers, officials, employees, agents, and volunteers, are to be covered as additional insureds on Owner's Commercial General Liability insurance policy.

7.2 The Parties waive any and all rights of subrogation against each other, including their respective elected or appointed officials, boards, agencies, officers, agents, employees, and volunteers, which any insurer of a Party may acquire against the other Party.

7.3 For any and all claims related to this Agreement, Owner's insurance shall be primary unless claims, losses, costs, liabilities, expenses, judgments or damages arise out of the sole negligence of City or its employees, representatives or contractors.

7.4 Owner shall furnish City with copies of all policies or certificates as outlined herein, whether new or modified, promptly upon receipt. No policy subject to Owner's agreement with City shall be canceled or materially changed except after thirty (30) days' notice by the insurer to City. Certificates, including renewal certificates, may be mailed or delivered to the City at 627 W. 18th Street, Merced, California 95340.

8. <u>Defense and Indemnification</u>. Owner shall indemnify, protect, hold harmless, and defend City from any and all loss, cost, liability or expense, and from any judgments or damages to any person or property arising or resulting, directly or indirectly, from the condition of the Improvements, or in connection with the installation and/or maintenance of the Improvements. Notwithstanding the foregoing, Owner's indemnity and release herein shall not extend to losses, costs, liability, expense, judgments or damages arising out of the sole negligence of City or its employees, representatives or contractors, or arising from causes not related to Owner's Improvements.

9. <u>Representations and Warranties</u>. Owner hereby represents and warrants that Owner has full power and authority to execute and deliver this Agreement and to make and accept the obligations contemplated hereunder.

10. <u>Compliance with Laws</u>. Each of the Parties shall at all times comply fully with all applicable governmental laws, ordinances, rules, codes, regulations, and permit requirements pertaining to the use of the City Right-of-Way.

11. <u>Waiver</u>. The failure of any of the Parties or their successors to enforce any of the terms and provisions set forth herein shall not constitute a waiver of the right to enforce the same thereafter.

12. <u>Entire Agreement</u>. This Agreement constitutes the entire integrated agreement of the Parties with respect to the subject matter of this Agreement. This Agreement may not be amended or terminated except by a writing signed by authorized signatories of all Parties.

13. <u>Construction</u>. The section headings have been inserted for convenience only, and shall not be considered or referred to in resolving questions of interpretation or construction. Wherever the context hereof may

so require, the singular shall include the plural and the masculine shall include the feminine and neuter. This Agreement shall be interpreted pursuant to its plain and ordinary meaning, as though prepared by both Parties, and in accordance with the laws of the State of California.

14. <u>Successors and Assigns</u>. The rights and obligations of the Parties hereunder shall be binding on and inure to the benefit of the Parties hereto and the successors and assigns of the Parties hereto. This Agreement, and the covenants, rights, duties, benefits and burdens described herein, constitute covenants running with the land that benefit and bind the Property, and each Party and their successors or assigns. If City vacates the City Right-of-Way in accordance with California law, then this Agreement shall terminate and be of no further force and effect, in which case Owner may use its Property unencumbered by the City Right-of-Way.

15. <u>Recordation of Agreement</u>. Either of the Parties may cause this Agreement or a memorandum thereof to be recorded in the Office of the County Recorder of Merced County, California.

16. <u>Governing Law and Venue</u>. The provisions of this Agreement shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of California. Venue for any legal action arising out of this Agreement shall be the Superior Court of the County of Merced, California.

17. <u>Attorneys' Fees</u>. Should it become necessary to take steps to enforce the terms of this Agreement, the prevailing party shall be entitled to recover its attorneys' fees and costs related to the enforcement of this Agreement.

18. <u>Counterparts</u>. This Agreement may be executed in two or more counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original, but all of which together shall constitute one and the same instrument.





The procedures have been modified to remain consistent with and complimentary to the various guidelines and policies adopted by the California Transportation Commission (CTC), including the current 2018 STP Guidelines (adopted on August 16, 2017).

CITY COUNCIL PRIORITIES

DISCUSSION

The City of Merced has entered into a master agreement with Caltrans covering Federal-aid projects in order to utilize certain Federal funds made available through legislation enacted by the Congress of the United States for use on local transportation facilities. The agreement covers projects that use Federal funds, which include, but are not limited to, the Regional Surface Transportation Program (RSTP), the Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality Improvement Program (CMAQ), the Transportation Enhancement Activities Program (TEA), the Highway Bridge Replacement and Rehabilitation Program (HBRR), and the AB1475 Safe Routes to School Program.

In addition to the master agreement, we must execute a specific supplemental agreement for each individual project. Caltrans has sent us Program Supplement No. 012-N1 covering use of \$996,000 in Federal funds for the construction costs associated with the Westerly Bike Path Connection. The local match of \$129,000 will come from Measure V - Alternative Modes and no General Funds will be used.

Reimbursements can be claimed through the Caltrans accounting office only after execution of the Supplemental Agreement. We, therefore, request Council approval of the Program Supplement, accepting the Federal funding for CML-5085(029). The City Attorney has reviewed and approved the agreement and has prepared a resolution for adoption.

History and Past Actions

On July 18, 2011, the City of Merced accepted funds for the Bear Creek Bike Path from the Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality Improvement Program (CMAQ) to design a Class 1 bike path from Buena Vista Drive to 16th Street, along State Route 59 and the Bear Creek Corridor.

In April 2016, the City of Merced reduced the project scope due to environmental issues along Bear Creek and the need to underground a Merced Irrigation canal located north of Bear Creek Drive. The project was renamed the Westerly Bike Path Connection and the categorical exemption was approved by Caltrans in April 2017.

The current project scope is to construct a Class 1 Bike Path south of Buena Vista Drive at Black Rascal Creek, thence along the south side of Black Rascal Creek, west to State Route 59 to the BNSF railroad tracks, thence easterly, north of the BNSF railroad tracks, approximately 1,300 feet to the existing bike path. A pedestrian/bike bridge will be installed over Black Rascal Creek.

In April 2018, Caltrans approved the Right-of-Way Certification, which allowed the City to apply for construction funds.

IMPACT ON CITY RESOURCES

Staff recommends accepting grant funds from the State of California adopted CMAQ Program, increasing revenue account 450-1104-321.32-00 in the amount of \$996,000 and appropriating the same to account 450-1104-637.65-00-111066 for Construction Engineering and Project Construction costs. Additionally, \$129,000 matching funds is available in Fund 075-Measure V Alternative Modes under project 119008-Projects To Be Determined.

1. A. The ADMINISTERING AGENCY will advertise, award and administer this project in accordance with the current published Local Assistance Procedures Manual.

B. ADMINISTERING AGENCY agrees that it will only proceed with work authorized for specific phase(s) with an "Authorization to Proceed" and will not proceed with future phase(s) of this project prior to receiving an "Authorization to Proceed" from the STATE for that phase(s) unless no further State or Federal funds are needed for those future phase(s).

C. STATE and ADMINISTERING AGENCY agree that any additional funds which might be made available by future Federal obligations will be encumbered on this PROJECT by use of a STATE-approved "Authorization to Proceed" and Finance Letter. ADMINISTERING AGENCY agrees that Federal funds available for reimbursement will be limited to the amounts obligated by the Federal Highway Administration.

D. Award information shall be submitted by the ADMINISTERING AGENCY to the District Local Assistance Engineer within 60 days of project contract award and prior to the submittal of the ADMINISTERING AGENCY'S first invoice for the construction contract.

Failure to do so will cause a delay in the State processing invoices for the construction phase. Attention is directed to Section 15.7 "Award Package" of the Local Assistance Procedures Manual.

E. ADMINISTERING AGENCY agrees, as a minimum, to submit invoices at least once every six months commencing after the funds are encumbered for each phase by the execution of this Project Program Supplement Agreement, or by STATE's approval of an applicable Finance Letter. STATE reserves the right to suspend future authorizations/obligations for Federal aid projects, or encumbrances for State funded projects, as well as to suspend invoice payments for any on-going or future project by ADMINISTERING AGENCY if PROJECT costs have not been invoiced by ADMINISTERING AGENCY for a six-month period.

If no costs have been invoiced for a six-month period, ADMINISTERING AGENCY agrees to submit for each phase a written explanation of the absence of PROJECT activity along with target billing date and target billing amount.

ADMINISTERING AGENCY agrees to submit the final report documents that collectively constitute a "Report of Expenditures" within one hundred eighty (180) days of PROJECT completion. Failure of ADMINISTERING AGENCY to submit a "Final Report of Expenditures" within 180 days of PROJECT completion will result in STATE imposing sanctions upon ADMINISTERING AGENCY in accordance with the current Local Assistance Procedures Manual.

F. Administering Agency shall not discriminate on the basis of race, religion, age, disability, color, national origin, or sex in the award and performance of any Federal-

assisted contract or in the administration of its DBE Program Implementation Agreement. The Administering Agency shall take all necessary and reasonable steps under 49 CFR Part 26 to ensure nondiscrimination in the award and administration of Federal-assisted contracts. The Administering Agency's DBE Implementation Agreement is incorporated by reference in this Agreement. Implementation of the DBE Implementation Agreement, including but not limited to timely reporting of DBE commitments and utilization, is a legal obligation and failure to carry out its terms shall be treated as a violation of this Agreement. Upon notification to the Administering Agency of its failure to carry out its DBE Implementation Agreement, the State may impose sanctions as provided for under 49 CFR Part 26 and may, in appropriate cases, refer the matter for enforcement under 18 U.S.C. 1001 and/or the Program Fraud Civil Remedies Act of 1986 (31 U.S.C. 3801 et seq.).

G. Any State and Federal funds that may have been encumbered for this project are available for disbursement for limited periods of time. For each fund encumbrance the limited period is from the start of the fiscal year that the specific fund was appropriated within the State Budget Act to the applicable fund Reversion Date shown on the State approved project finance letter. Per Government Code Section 16304, all project funds not liquidated within these periods will revert unless an executed Cooperative Work Agreement extending these dates is requested by the ADMINISTERING AGENCY and approved by the California Department of Finance.

ADMINISTERING AGENCY should ensure that invoices are submitted to the District Local Assistance Engineer at least 75 days prior to the applicable fund Reversion Date to avoid the lapse of applicable funds. C. ADMINISTERING AGENCY must have at least one copy of supporting backup documentation for costs incurred and claimed for reimbursement by ADMINISTERING AGENCY. ADMINISTERING AGENCY agrees to submit supporting backup documentation with invoices if requested by State. Acceptable backup documentation includes, but is not limited to, agency's progress payment to the contractors, copies of cancelled checks showing amounts made payable to vendors and contractors, and/or a computerized summary of PROJECT costs.

D. Indirect Cost Allocation Plan/Indirect Cost Rate Proposals (ICAP/ICRP), Central Service Cost Allocation Plans and related documentation are to be prepared and provided to STATE (Caltrans Audits & Investigations) for review and approval prior to ADMINISTERING AGENCY seeking reimbursement of indirect costs incurred within each fiscal year being claimed for State and federal reimbursement. ICAPs/ICRPs must be prepared in accordance with the requirements set forth in 2 CFR, Part 200, Chapter 5 of the Local Assistance Procedural Manual, and the ICAP/ICRP approval procedures established by STATE.

E. STATE will withhold the greater of either two (2) percent of the total of all federal funds encumbered for each PROGRAM SUPPLEMENT or \$40,000 until ADMINISTERING AGENCY submits the Final Report of Expenditures for each completed PROGRAM SUPPLEMENT PROJECT.

F. Payments to ADMINISTERING AGENCY for PROJECT-related travel and subsistence (per diem) expenses of ADMINISTERING AGENCY forces and its contractors and subcontractors claimed for reimbursement or as local match credit shall not exceed rates authorized to be paid rank and file STATE employees under current State Department of Personnel Administration (DPA) rules. If the rates invoiced by ADMINISTERING AGENCY are in excess of DPA rates, ADMINISTERING AGENCY is responsible for the cost difference, and any overpayments inadvertently paid by STATE shall be reimbursed to STATE by ADMINISTERING AGENCY on demand within thirty (30) days of such invoice.

G. ADMINISTERING AGENCY agrees to comply with 2 CFR, Part 200, Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles and Audit Requirement for Federal Awards.

H. ADMINISTERING AGENCY agrees, and will assure that its contractors and subcontractors will be obligated to agree, that Contract Cost Principles and Procedures,

48 CFR, Federal Acquisition Regulations System, Chapter 1, Part 31, et seq., shall be used to determine the allowability of individual PROJECT cost items.

I. Every sub-recipient receiving PROJECT funds under this AGREEMENT shall comply with 2 CFR, Part 200, 23 CFR, 48 CFR Chapter 1, Part 31, Local Assistance Procedures, Public Contract Code (PCC) 10300-10334 (procurement of goods), PCC 10335-10381 (non-A&E services), and other applicable STATE and FEDERAL regulations.

J. Any PROJECT costs for which ADMINISTERING AGENCY has received payment or credit that are determined by subsequent audit to be unallowable under 2 CFR, Part 200, 23 CFR, 48 CFR, Chapter 1, Part 31, and other applicable STATE and FEDERAL regulations, are subject to repayment by ADMINISTERING AGENCY to STATE.

K. STATE reserves the right to conduct technical and financial audits of PROJECT WORK and records and ADMINISTERING AGENCY agrees, and shall require its contractors and subcontractors to agree, to cooperate with STATE by making all appropriate and relevant PROJECT records available for audit and copying as required by the following paragraph:

ADMINISTERING AGENCY, ADMINISTERING AGENCY'S contractors and subcontractors, and STATE shall each maintain and make available for inspection and audit by STATE, the California State Auditor, or any duly authorized representative of STATE or the United States all books, documents, papers, accounting records, and other evidence pertaining to the performance of such contracts, including, but not limited to, the costs of administering those various contracts and ADMINISTERING AGENCY shall furnish copies thereof if requested. All of the above referenced parties shall make such AGREEMENT, PROGRAM SUPPLEMENT, and contract materials available at their respective offices at all reasonable times during the entire PROJECT period and for three (3) years from the date of submission of the final expenditure report by the STATE to the FHWA.

L. SUBJECT: Public Hearing- Amendment to Merced Municipal Code Section 10.44, "Bicycles"

REPORT IN BRIEF

The Bicycle Advisory Commission has recommended the amendment of the Merced Municipal Code Section 10.44, "Bicycles," to modernize the bicycle registration process while continuing to preserve the Police Department's enforcement ability.

RECOMMENDATION

City Council - Adopt a motion introducing **Ordinance 2491**, an Ordinance of the City Council of the City of Merced, California, amending Section 10.44, "Bicycles," of the Merced Municipal Code.

1. Approve the recommendation of the Bicycle Advisory Commission as modified per the recommendation of the Police Department; or,

2. Deny the recommendation; or,

3. Approve, subject to modification (identify specific changes to the Ordinance amended in City Council motion); or,

5. Continue to a future City Council meeting (date and time to be specified in City Council motion).

AUTHORITY

This request amends Section 10.44 of the Merced Municipal Code (MMC) regarding bicycles.

CITY COUNCIL PRIORITIES

Not applicable.

DISCUSSION

Background

At the Bicycle Advisory Commission (BAC) meeting of April 25, 2017, the Commission reviewed MMC 10.44, "Bicycles," which outlines the City's bicycle license registration process. The Commission expressed their desire to have the code section updated to reflect modern practices, as well as remove barriers to cycling. Feedback from the League of American Bicyclists on Merced's unsuccessful application for status as a Bronze-level Bicycle Friendly Community included the

suggestion to repeal local laws that restrict the right of cyclists to travel. The BAC believes that the local bicycle registration process currently in place in Merced restricts bicyclists' right to travel and proposes the amendment of MMC 10.44, "Bicycles" to eliminate this barrier.

At the BAC meeting of October 24, 2017, a subcommittee was created with the purpose of making recommendations regarding updated language for MMC 10.44, "Bicycles". This subcommittee met with Lt. Struble of the Police Department on January 22, 2018, in order to understand the Police Department's role and needs with relationship to enforcement and bicycle registration. After the meeting, the subcommittee created draft language amending MMC 10.44, "Bicycles," which was recommended by the BAC to the City Council for adoption.

At the BAC meeting of April 24, 2018, the BAC reviewed and Recommended to the City Council the draft language provided at that meeting. The minutes and staff report of that meeting are provided as Attachments 1 and 2. The proposed language for the updated Municipal Code is provided as Attachment 3. A comparison of the new language to the current MMC is provided in redline format as Attachment 4 and the current Municipal Code is provided as Attachment 5.

Amendment Summary

The proposed amendment removes the \$2 license fee, the annual renewal of license, the requirement that a bicycle be brought to the Police Station for licensing, and the requirement that a license sticker be displayed on all bicycles operated on the public ways in the City of Merced. The amendment includes a requirement that bicycles be registered on a national electronic registry and that some form of proof of this registration be available on the person of a cyclist to be presented upon request. This proof can be in digital or paper format.

Police Department Recommendations

Lt. Struble of the Merced Police Department had the following suggestions regarding the proposed changes to MMC 10.44, "Bicycles" (underlined text is new).

1. Modify the title of Section 10.44.020 to "Bicycle Registration";

2. Modify Section 10.44.040 to read, "The registration issued pursuant to this chapter shall be accessible upon request <u>by law enforcement;</u>

3. Add Section 10.44.110, titled "Report- Secondhand dealers."

Persons engaged in the business of buying secondhand bicycles are required to make a weekly report to the chief of police specifying:

- A. The name and address of the person from whom each bicycle is purchased;
- B. The description of each bicycle purchased;
- C. The frame number thereof;
- D. <u>The number of the license plate, tag or sticker found thereon, if any.</u>

Changes 1 and 2 are for clarity purposes. Change 3 is to maintain a section that the police department feels should not be removed from the code. The proposed Ordinance, provided as

Attachment 6, includes these recommendations.

IMPACT ON CITY RESOURCES

No appropriation of funds is needed. The proposed amendments would eliminate the City's bicycle registration fees; these fees have not totaled more than \$96 per year in the period from 2009-2017. Additionally, the obligation for the Police Department to assist with license applications, provide stickers, and maintain records would be eliminated by the proposed amendment. This would reduce the amount of staff time and materials required for the administration of the registration program, providing a savings projected to be greater than the total amount of fees collected on an annual basis.

BACKGROUND

At the Bicycle Advisory Commission (BAC) meeting of October 24, 2017, a subcommittee was created with the purpose of making recommendations to the BAC regarding updated language for Merced Municipal Code Chapter 10.44. At the BAC meeting of December 12, 2017, the subcommittee provided the BAC with a draft ordinance update. To resolve potential differences between the proposed revisions and the needs of the Merced Police Department, the subcommittee met with Lt. Struble of the Police Department on January 22, 2018. At the BAC meeting of February 27, 2018, the BAC gave staff direction to move forward with the proposed language for an update to the Merced Municipal Code.

DISCUSSION

The proposed revision to Merced Municipal Code Chapter 10.44 is provided as Attachment A. The current, adopted version of Merced Municipal Code Chapter 10.44 is provided for comparison purposes as Attachment B. The proposed language proposes removing the local registration system in favor of utilizing national electronic registries, while continuing to require proof of licensure to allow for the Police Department to continue to utilize registration as an enforcement tool. Specific language related to parking bicycles in such a way that they do not impede passage of pedestrians has also been added. The Draft Ordinance revising Merced Municipal Code Chapter 10.44 is provided as Attachment C.

<u>ACTION</u>

The BAC should make a formal recommendation of the proposed revisions and the Ordinance to the Merced City Council. A representative from the BAC should attend the City Council meeting at which the Ordinance will be reviewed to provide an explanation and details.

10.44.040 - Registration—Proof.

The registration issued pursuant to this chapter shall be accessible upon request by law enforcement via printout or mobile device while the bicycle is in operation.

10.44.050 - Obedience to traffic control devices

The operator of any bicycle shall obey the instructions of any official traffic control device placed in accordance with this chapter unless otherwise directed by a police officer or other authorized person.

10.44.060 - Speed

No person shall operate a bicycle at a speed greater than is reasonable and prudent under the conditions then existing and in no event at a speed greater than the prima facie speed limit applicable to motor vehicles.

10.44.070 - Emerging from alley or driveway

The operator of a bicycle emerging from an alley, driveway, or building shall, upon approaching a sidewalk or the sidewalk area extending across any alleyway, yield the right-of-way to all pedestrians approaching on said sidewalks or sidewalk area, and upon entering the roadway shall yield the right-of-way to all vehicles approaching on said roadway.

10.44.080 - Riding on sidewalks

Whenever any person is riding a bicycle upon a sidewalk, such person shall yield the right-ofway to any pedestrian and shall give an audible signal before overtaking and passing such pedestrian. At the intersection of two or more sidewalks, where the vision of the operator of a bicycle is so restricted by hedges, bushes, buildings, or any other obstruction so that the approach of a pedestrian cannot be observed and there is danger of a collision with the pedestrian, the operator of a bicycle shall dismount and walk through the intersection of the sidewalks.

10.44.090 - Parking

No person shall park a bicycle upon any public street, sidewalk, bicycle lane, or bicycle path in such a way that it impedes pedestrian traffic.

10.44.100 - Violation—Penalty.

Every person violating any of the provisions of this chapter shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor. In addition to the penalties provided by Chapter 1.08, the court may impound and retain possession of any such bicycle, the subject of such violation, and may retain possession thereof until the registration provided for in this chapter has been obtained by the person required so to do.

10.44.030 Registration – Operation restricted.

When registered, bicycle registration shall entitle the owner to operate such bicycle for which the registration has been issued upon all the streets, public highways and designated bicycle trails of the city. Bicycles may also be operated on all the sidewalks of the city except the following, when appropriate signs are displayed thereon: Main Street from G to V Street, 18th Street from Martin Luther King, Jr. Way to N Street, I Street from 16th to 18th Street, Martin Luther King, Jr. Way from 16th to 18th Street, K Street from 16th to 18th Street, L Street from 16th to 18th Street, M Street from 16th to 20th Street and N Street from 16th to 18th Street.

10.44.040 Registration – Proof.

The registration issued pursuant to this Chapter shall be accessible upon request by law enforcement via printout or mobile device while the bicycle is in operation.

10.44.050 Obedience to Traffic Control Devices.

The operator of any bicycle shall obey the instructions of any official traffic control device placed in accordance with this Chapter unless otherwise directed by a police officer or other authorized person.

10.44.060 Speed.

No person shall operate a bicycle at a speed greater than is reasonable and prudent under the conditions then existing and in no event at a speed greater than the prima facie speed limit applicable to motor vehicles.

10.44.070 Emerging from Alley or Driveway.

The operator of a bicycle emerging from an alley, driveway, or building shall, upon approaching a sidewalk or the sidewalk area extending across any alleyway, yield the right-of-way to all pedestrians approaching on said sidewalks or sidewalk area, and upon entering the roadway shall yield the right-of-way to all vehicles approaching on said roadway.

10.44.080 Riding on Sidewalks.

Whenever any person is riding a bicycle upon a sidewalk, such person shall yield the right-of-way to any pedestrian and shall give an audible signal before overtaking and passing such pedestrian. At the intersection of two or more sidewalks, where the vision of the operator of a bicycle is so restricted by hedges, bushes, buildings, or any other obstruction so that the approach of a pedestrian cannot be observed and there is danger of a collision with the pedestrian, the operator of a bicycle shall dismount and walk through the intersection of the sidewalks.

10.44.090 Parking.

No person shall park a bicycle upon any public street, sidewalk, bicycle lane, or bicycle path in such a way that it impedes pedestrian traffic.

10.44.100 – Violation – Penalty.

Every person violating any of the provisions of this chapter shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor. In addition to the penalties provided by Chapter 1.08, the court may impound and retain possession of any such bicycle, the subject of such violation, and may retain possession thereof until the registration provided for in this chapter has been obtained by the person required so to do.

10.44.110 Report – Secondhand Dealer.

Persons engaged in the business of buying secondhand bicycles are required to make a weekly report to the Chief of Police specifying:

A. The name and address of the person from whom each bicycle is purchased;

B. The description of each bicycle purchased;

C. The frame number thereof; and,

D. The number of the license plate, tag or sticker found thereon, if any."

SECTION 2. EFFECTIVE DATE. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect thirty (30) days after its adoption.

SECTION 3. SEVERABILITY. If any section, subsection, subdivision, sentence, clause, phrase, or portion of this Ordinance, is for any reason held to be invalid or unconstitutional by the decision of any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance. The City Council hereby declares that it would have adopted this Ordinance, and each section, subsection, subdivision, sentence, clause, phrase, or portion thereof, irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, subdivisions, sentences, clauses, phrases, or portions thereof be declared invalid or unconstitutional.

SECTION 4. PUBLICATION. The City Clerk is directed to cause a summary of this Ordinance to be published in the official newspaper at least once within fifteen (15) days after its adoption showing the vote thereon.

SUBJECT: Update on Celebrate Safe Illegal Fireworks Enforcement and Public Outreach Campaign

REPORT IN BRIEF

Provides an update on the 2018 Fourth of July Celebrate Safe Campaign and efforts to address illegal fireworks within the City.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the City Council accept the report and provide staff with recommendations and direction for addressing issues related to the use of illegal fireworks for next year's Fourth of July holiday.

ALTERNATIVES

- 1. Refer to staff for reconsideration of specific items as requested by Council; or,
- 2. Continue to a future City Council meeting (date and time to be specified in the motion).

AUTHORITY

City Charter Section 200.

CITY COUNCIL PRIORITIES

The inaugural Celebrate Safe Campaign was developed by Staff at the direction of the City Council and City Manager to enhance public safety on and around the Fourth of July holiday.

DISCUSSION

The use of illegal fireworks on and around the Fourth of July holiday is an issue that effects most cities and communities across the state. The attendant explosions caused by the use of illegal fireworks disturbs the peace and can cause stress for residents, veterans and pets. In addition, the explosives used are powerful and create a risk of serious bodily injury and property damage.

Following the Fourth of July holiday in 2017, at the direction of the City Council, the City Manager asked four City departments to develop a taskforce and campaign to address the issues associated with illegal fireworks. This led to the creation of the Illegal Fireworks Taskforce, which was made up of representatives from the City's Police, Fire and Information Technology Departments as well as the City Attorney's Office.

The Taskforce's goal was to promote public safety by reducing the number of illegal fireworks being used within the City. To accomplish this goal, the Taskforce developed four primary objectives:

- 1. **Public Outreach** Develop campaign to promote the City's Zero Tolerance and Be a Good Neighbor slogans to remind the public of consequences of illegal fireworks and the effects that they may have on neighbors, pets and military veterans.
- 2. **Illegal Fireworks Surrender and Seizure** Host a Safe Surrender Day to provide the public with an opportunity to surrender illegal fireworks without fear of prosecution. Seize illegal fireworks being sold in the City.
- 3. **Tip lines** Development of multiple avenues to report illegal fireworks, including a dedicated tip telephone line, the Merced Connect App, and an email address. Also set up an expanded dispatch on July 3rd and 4th for the purpose of removing a bulk of the calls reporting illegal fireworks from the 9-1-1 center.
- 4. **Enforcement** Increase police patrol/enforcement and fire department personnel on the 3rd and 4th of July for administrative citations and criminal citations/arrests.

Overall, the public's response to the City's campaign was positive. Below is a review of the Taskforce's objectives.

Objective 1. Public Outreach

The Taskforce developed a multifaceted public outreach campaign which included utility bill inserts, street banners, numerous newspaper articles, posters, radio announcements, stickers and a kick off press conference. These materials displayed or communicated the Zero Tolerance and Be a Good Neighbor slogans along with the Celebrate Safe tip line number, email address and Merced Connect icon image. On July 3rd and 4th, there were approximately 470 reports of possession, sales or use of illegal fireworks to these alternative reporting methods. This shows that the public outreach campaign was successful in educating the public to report illegal fireworks and to do so by using a dedicated method and not calling 9-1-1. The banners and posters used for this year's campaign can be reused in future campaigns.

Objective 2. Surrender or Seizure of Illegal Fireworks

Safe Surrender

The Fire Department organized and advertised a Safe Surrender Day, which was held at Station 51 on June 30, 2018, from 9:00 a.m. until 1:00 p.m. This event provided residents the opportunity to surrender illegal fireworks safely without the fear of prosecution. Two residents surrendered illegal fireworks at this event, and while doing so, they thanked the department for their efforts in getting illegal fireworks seized and safely disposed. In addition, two other couples stopped by the station to thank the department for their efforts (they did not surrender any fireworks). The fact that illegal fireworks were surrendered during this event accomplished the objective set for the event. The surrendered illegal fireworks were not discharged thus eliminating any risk of possible injuries and/or property damage.

Sting Operations

The City's DART Team was successful in conducting several sting operations prior to July 4th on individuals advertising illegal fireworks for sale on Craigslist. These stings led to the arrests of 5 individuals on felony charges. One of these arrests involved 782 illegal fireworks estimated to be worth \$1,500. These arrests were highlighted as part of the Zero Tolerance campaign and resulted in other advertisements for illegal fireworks being removed from Craigslist.

In total, including the fireworks received at the Safe Surrender event, the sting operations and those seized on July 4th, the City confiscated about 650 pounds of illegal fireworks.

Objective 3- Tip lines

The goal of this objective was to keep reports of illegal fireworks from inundating the City's 9-1-1 system. To accomplish this, the City's IT Department set up a tip line (388-Safe), a dedicated email address (Celebratesafe@cityofmerced.org) and a module on the Merced Connect App to report illegal fireworks. These alternate ways to report illegal fireworks received a total of 470 reports on July 3rd and 4th, which demonstrates that there was good community buy-in for the program. A breakdown of these reports is as follows:

Method of Reporting	July 3, 2018	July 4, 2018	Total
Celebrate Safe Hotline	38 calls	302 calls	340 calls
Merced Connect	34 reports	76 reports	110 reports
Email	9 emails	11 emails	20 emails
Totals	81	389	470

Notably, of the above calls, the tip line received more than 20 calls reporting illegal fireworks in neighboring jurisdictions such as Delhi, Planada and Atwater. These callers called the Merced tip line seeking the City's help with illegal fireworks in their communities. In addition, 6 calls to the hotline were transferred directly to a 9-1-1 dispatcher as the caller was reporting a non-firework emergency.

One negative factor that effected the ability to respond to calls made to the tip line involved reluctant reporters. Specifically, numerous callers called to report the use of illegal fireworks but they refused to identify themselves or provide a contact number for law enforcement to use to follow up on their reports. In addition, many callers reported the use of illegal fireworks in vicinities rather than providing specific addresses or locations. This made it difficult for law enforcement officers to locate the area in which the illegal fireworks were being discharged.

Objective 4- Enforcement

The City allows the use and sale of Safe and Sane fireworks from noon on June 28 until noon on July 6th. This year, the Fourth of July holiday fell on a Wednesday. As many of our working residents have the day off on July 4th, the Taskforce surmised that the use of illegal fireworks may spike on the evening of July 3rd as well as the 4th. Accordingly, during the permissible Safe and Sane fireworks

sales and usage period, the Taskforce's enforcement efforts focused on July 3rd and 4th. On those evenings there were extra police and fire personnel on duty for enforcement and emergency response. In addition, a separate dispatch center was staffed by volunteer City employees to handle calls, emails and Merced Connect reports of illegal fireworks. As it turned out, there was a drastic difference in the number of reports of illegal fireworks usage between the evenings of July 3rd and 4th with 81 reports on July 3rd and 389 reports being made on July 4th. Based on these stats, next year's campaign could focus its heavy enforcement efforts on July 4th.

This year on the 3rd and 4th of July, the City's dispatch center received only a slight increase in calls compared to last year. The below table summarizes those calls:

Calls	2017	2018	Percentage Increase
9-1-1 Calls	483	485	.5% Increase

Had the separate dispatch center not been in operation to answer calls reporting illegal fireworks from the tip line, the calls to the City's 9-1-1 system would have drastically increased this year.

While the number of fire incidents decreased for the 4th of July holiday in 2018, overall, the number of incidents increased, mostly due to an increased in EMS calls. Below is a summary of incidents for the reporting period of June 28 through July 6th for 2017 and 2018:

On the evenings of July 3rd and 4th, the Merced Fire Department only responded to 1 structure fire, which was caused by the disposal of illegal and legal fireworks into a garbage can. In addition 12 administrative citations for the use of illegal fireworks were issued, each having a \$1,000 fine.


Celebrate Safe Hotline Results

- The Celebrate Safe hotline answered 340 calls. Without the hotline, the calls would have been made directly into our dispatch center on 9-1-1 lines or other emergency/business numbers.
- More than 20 calls to the hotline were reporting incidents in Planada, Delhi, **Atwater and in the County of Merced.**
- These stats shows community buy-in for the program and that the public • outreach campaign was effective.

Celebrate Safe Hotline results

- Six calls into the hotline were directly transferred to Dispatch as the caller was reporting a non-firework emergency.
- **Negative- callers often reported fireworks being discharged in vicinities (i.e.,** near Burbank school) and not a specific address. Also, many callers refused to provide their name or call back numbers.
- Next year we will need more volunteers to staff the hotline on July 4th.

Lessons Learned

- **Enforcement of the sale and use of illegal fireworks should increase next year to** reduce the use of Illegal Fireworks.
- Additional police officers and fire investigators should be scheduled to work the special detail, especially on July 4th.
- **Expanded dispatch greatly reduced the number of calls into the 9-1-1 center.**

Lessons Learned from Pilot

- The addition of the engine company assisted in handing the emergency incidents on the peak of the 4th of July.
- The addition of a resource officer in the dispatch center helped make maximum use of limited Fire Department resources.
- A code approved storage unit should be obtained for the safe storage of illegal fireworks and combustible and flammable materials/liquids.

Lessons Learned from Pilot

- The tip line, Merced Connect, and email assisted the public in reporting the sale and use of illegal fireworks.
- **Reluctant reporters the public did not want to provide contact information.**
- Future public relations campaigns should stress the need for cooperation by residents.

Lessons Learned from Pilot

- **Consider ways to effectuate a community culture change regarding the use of** illegal fireworks.
- Learn from other entities. Review their debriefings and enforcement efforts. For example, Sacramento has a Fireworks Mitigation Task Force that includes two **ATF** agents.
- Host an illegal fireworks forum in early 2019.
- **Consider organizing a public pyrotechnic show to help reduce the number of** illegal fireworks being used in the City.

REPORT IN BRIEF

Requests the City Council to set a public hearing for August 20, 2018, to consider amending Merced Municipal Code Section 10.16.010- Speed Limits to implement recommendations made in the speed zone study.

City Council - Adopt a motion setting a public hearing for Monday, August 20, 2018 at 7:00 PM to consider amending the Speed Zone Ordinance.

- 3. Refer to staff for reconsideration of specific items; or,
- 4. Deny.

AUTHORITY

Charter of the City of Merced, Section 200.

CITY COUNCIL PRIORITIES

As provided for in the FY 2016-17 General Fund appropriation.

DISCUSSION

The City of Merced conducted its last speed zone study in 2011 and adopted Ordinance No. 2370 that became effective June 15, 2011. The existing speed zone study has expired and currently the City speed limits are unenforceable by radar without an updated engineering and traffic speed study. For this reason, Staff recommends Council set a public hearing to consider amending Merced Municipal Code Section 10.16.010 to reflect the 2018 Speed Zone Study.

History and Past Actions

On January 17, 2017, City Council approved a general fund appropriation in the amount of \$100,000 to conduct a speed zone study.

In April 2017, the City of Merced contracted with Omni-Means, LTD to conduct the speed zone study. The study is now complete and must be adopted by ordinance at a future City Council meeting.

ATTACHMENTS

1. Examples of Volunteer Recognition Programs

Elk Grove

2011 implemented "Mayor's Volunteer Awards," for those who go "above and beyond." The selection criteria:

- Demonstrates exceptional commitment to volunteerism by helping with a special project or ongoing activities
- Demonstrates exemplary leadership, creativity, cooperation, and hard work in service to others
- Serves as a role model by inspiring others

A selection committee is formed and meets to evaluate the nominations.

Westlake Village

Holds an annual reception before a Council meeting for the volunteers and during the meeting recognizes them with a gift. i.e. something with the City logo on it such as a folding camp chair, an umbrella, a coffee mug, and small soft cooler.

San Carlos

Holds an annual volunteer recognition dinner and invites all Commission members and on-going volunteers as well as the chair/president of each local service organization (i.e. Rotary, Kiwanis, Lions, etc.). It started off well-attended, but after 6 years, the City is exploring a change in format.

Pleasant Hill

Holds an annual volunteer reception in December for on-going volunteers like commissioners, PD volunteers, and senior van service volunteers (not one-timers). It's catered (with wine) and the City gives them a gift and the Mayor says a few words. Funding is in the Community Relations budget (a division of the City Manager's Office) and is approximately \$5,000 per year.

El Cerrito

Holds two events, both buffet dinners, for a total cost of between \$3,200 to \$4,800 depending on venue, usually held at the community center with a BBQ, sides and desert. It comes out of the Council event budget. One is for volunteers (senior center, recreation etc.) and the other for Commissioners. (They have 106 Commissioners being recognized.)

Santa Fe Springs

Holds an annual recognition for all the City's volunteers, where they receive certificates. The event is coordinated by the library.

Santa Cruz

Holds an annual volunteer appreciation event organized through the HR department. A reception is held before a council meeting and Council members thank the volunteers. Volunteers come in to the meeting and the council members read a small description of each volunteer and an award is presented to them.
