CITY COUNCIL PRIORITIES

The AFG grant application aligns with Council's goal of Future Planning by overhauling its antiquated radio system and taking the financial burden off of taxpayers.

The FP&S grant aligns with Council's goal of Future Planning by purchasing equipment with the primary goal of reducing injury and preventing death among high-risk populations.

The SAFER grant application aligns with Council's Staffing goal of Staffing (General Fund) to ensure that there are sufficient Fire Fighters to provide public safety.

DISCUSSION

Congress created the AFG and SAFER grant programs to help address the significant staffing, equipment, training, and health and safety needs of fire departments. SAFER provides funding to help pay the costs associated with hiring personnel to maintain safe staffing levels, while AFG grants fund equipment, training and other fire department needs. Together these grant programs help ensure that fire departments have the necessary training, equipment, and staffing to respond to emergency calls annually and to continue to reduce community risk.

The Fire Department is seeking authorization to submit three grant applications in the estimated amount of \$5,328,042 with an estimated local match requirement of \$106,469.

AFG Purpose

The primary goal is to provide funding for the purchase of firefighting equipment, vehicles, training, or wellness and fitness programs.

In 2014, the Fire Department was awarded a \$66,773 grant to purchase 16 Pulse CO-Oximeters with the goal of reducing the permanent debilitating effects of undetected CO poisoning to citizens, visitors, and firefighters.

The Merced Fire Department proposes to replace its antiquated portable radios, which are used in emergency situations to communicate with one another.

FP&S Purpose

The FP&S grants are part of the AFG. The primary goal of these grants is to reduce injury and prevent death among high-risk populations

The Fire Department had previously been awarded a \$72,678 grant in 2013 and funds were used towards implementation of a health and wellness program, training of peer fitness counselors, and acquiring weight and cardio equipment.

This year, the department intends to purchase fire investigation/arson cameras and accessories with the goal of reducing injuries and preventing death among visitors and residents of our city.

SAFER Purpose

Research had shown that many fire departments nationwide lacked the minimum number of firefighters to safely fight building, vehicle, and other structure fires. Therefore, SAFER was created to provide funding to fire departments to help them increase or maintain the number of trained, "front line" firefighters available in their communities. The goal of SAFER is to enhance the fire department's abilities to comply with staffing, response and operational standards established by the National Fire Protection Agency.

In 2006, the Merced Fire Department was awarded a 5-year grant for the purpose of hiring 12 new firefighters. Over the life of the 5-year grant, the total grant funding was as follows:

The grant's terms required that the city absorb 100% of the firefighter's salaries and fringe benefits at the end of Year-5 (FY10/11), which sadly coincided with the Great Recession and the city was unable to retain the 12 firefighters. Fortunately, through a departmental reorganization and attrition no firefighters were laid off. The department learned that at the end of the grant that a sustainable revenue source would be needed to be in place before pursuing another SAFER grant.

The COVID-19 pandemic has created economic hardships to local jurisdictions and fire departments; therefore, FEMA is providing fire departments with 100% of the funding needed to hire or rehire firefighters facing layoffs over the next three years. In other words, they will reimburse for 100% of the firefighter's salaries and fringe benefits for the term of the grant, which is three years. The department intends to hire 12 new firefighters to create a relief pool of personnel to fill shift vacancies, while reducing overtime costs.

Firefighter salary and fringe benefits estimates are based upon a Step 5 Firefighter, \$118,296.36/firefighter x 12 firefighters = \$1,419.556.32/annually. Other costs (recruitment, medical/physical exams, turnouts, radios, etc.) will be borne by the Human Resources and the Fire Department. Note: Should the MOU and/or salary and benefits increase, the estimated firefighter's cost would increase accordingly. Because the firefighter's costs are calculated at a step 5, no further step increases were included in the annual estimates.

On January 5, 2004, Community Facilities District No. 2003-2 (Services) was formed to collect special taxes in certain improvement areas related to growth. The special taxes pay for costs including, but not limited to, public safety, landscape, storm drain, sidewalk, park and parkway maintenance.

On July 19, 2004, the City Council formed Community Facilities District No. 2003-1 (Bellevue Ranch East) to provide public infrastructure financing. The District issued \$12,745,000 in 2005 Special Tax Bonds on August 4, 2005. Due to favorable interest rates on bonds, the 2005 Special Tax Bonds were refunded and the District issued the 2016 Special Tax Refunding Bonds of \$8,985,000 on August 30, 2016.

On November 21, 2005, the City Council formed Community Facilities District No. 2005-1 (Bellevue Ranch West Improvement Area 1) to provide public infrastructure financing. The District issued

\$7,410,000 in 2006 Special Tax Bonds on July 27, 2006. Because of favorable interest rates on bonds, the 2006 Special Tax Bonds were refunded and the District issued the 2017 Special Tax Refunding Bonds of \$6,330,000 on December 19, 2017.

On July 3, 2006, City Council formed Community Facilities District No. 2006-1 (Moraga of Merced) to provide public infrastructure financing. The district Issued \$5,840,000 in 2006 Special Tax Bonds on December 14, 2006. Due to favorable interest rates on bonds, the 2006 Special Tax Bonds were refunded and the District issued the 2019 Special Tax Refunding Bonds of \$4,080,000 on December 10, 2019.

The Government Code Sections listed above require annual reports to be prepared and filed with an agency's governing board. Attached are reports that meet the requirement.

I. Introduction

City of Merced Community Facilities District No. 2003-2 (Services)

The City of Merced Community Facilities District No. 2003-2 (the "CFD" or "CFD No. 2003-2") is located in the City of Merced (the "City"), in Merced County, in the State of California, approximately 132 miles south of Sacramento. On January 5, 2004, the City passed Resolution No. 2004-3, forming CFD No. 2003-2. A successful landowner election was then held, authorizing the levy of the special tax. The special tax funds general services authorized under the Mello-Roos Act which include, but are not limited to:

- 1) Public safety services, including police and fire protection.
- 2) Landscaping, sidewalk, park, and parkway maintenance (including lighting).
- 3) Flood control services.
- 4) Miscellaneous administrative fees and expenses.

CFD No. 2003-2 currently is made up of 37 distinct improvement areas throughout the City. As additional new areas within the City apply for development approval, those development areas will annex to CFD No. 2003-2.

The Mello-Roos Community Facilities Act of 1982

The California State Legislature approved the Mello-Roos Community Facilities Act of 1982 that provides for the levy of a special tax within a defined geographic area, namely a community facilities district, if such a levy is approved by two-thirds of the qualified electors in the area. Community facilities districts can generate funding for a broad range of facilities and eligible services. These services include police protection services, fire protection and suppression services, library services, recreation program services, maintenance of roads, parks, parkways and open space, and flood and storm protection services. Special taxes can be allocated to property in any reasonable manner other than on an ad valorem basis.

II. SENATE BILL 165 REPORTING REQUIREMENTS

On September 18, 2000, former Governor Gray Davis approved Senate Bill 165 which enacted the "Local Agency Special Tax and Bond Accountability Act". In approving the bill, the Legislature declared that local agencies need to demonstrate to the voters that special taxes and bond proceeds are being spent on the facilities and services for which they were intended. To further this objective, the Legislature added Section 50075.3 to the California Government Code setting forth annual reporting requirements relative to special taxes collected by a local public agency. The amount of special taxes collected and expended for the fiscal year 2019-20 special tax levy is set forth in the table on the following page:

This Continuing Disclosure Annual Report ("Annual Report") contains certain information required to be filed annually per SEC rule 15c2-12(b)(5) (the "Rule") by the City of Merced (the "City") Community Facilities District No. 2006-1 (Moraga of Merced) (the "CFD"). The Rule is applicable to the 2019 Special Tax Refunding Bonds (the "Series 2019 Bonds") issued in the aggregate principal amount of \$4,080,000 by the CFD on December 10, 2019. The Rule requires that an issuer undertake in a written agreement or contract, for the benefit of holders of the securities issued, to file with national and state repositories the following:

- i. Certain financial information as presented in the Continuing Disclosure Agreement
- ii. Audited financial statements of the City
- iii. Notice of certain enumerated significant events
- iv. Notice of any failure to provide such annual financial information as agreed

In compliance with the Rule, the City signed the Continuing Disclosure Agreement on December 1, 2019, requiring the City to provide annually, or as they occur, the aforementioned enumerated documents or events. Per the Continuing Disclosure Agreement, the City is required to file an annual report with the MSRB which includes:

- a) The balance in the Reserve Fund held under the Fiscal Agent Agreement.
 - → As of November 30, 2020, the balance in the Reserve Fund was \$324,335. The Reserve Fund Requirement is \$324,269; therefore, pursuant to the Series 2019 Bonds covenants, the Reserve Fund is fully funded.

 - → As of the date of this report, \$3,805,000 of the Series 2019 Bonds remains outstanding.

Adopting **Resolution 2021-07**, a Resolution of the City Council of Merced, California, authorizing the City Manager to provide economic assistance related to the economic impacts of COVID-19 and to allow qualified participants to pay the transient occupancy tax with a credit card without assessing the payor the credit card convenience fee; and,
- B. Authorizing the Finance Officer to administer the waivers; and,
- C. Approving a supplemental appropriation of \$15,000 from the unencumbered, unreserved fund balance of the General Fund in order to pay the additional credit card fees.

CITY COUNCIL PRIORITIES

Provide Economic Development assistance due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

DISCUSSION

The novel coronavirus outbreak began in Wuhan China in 2019 and spread across the globe and into the United States. As of Wednesday, January 20, 2021, there are 24,570 positive cases of COVID-19 and 316 deaths in Merced County.

Friday, March 13, 2020, the President of the United States declared a national emergency due to the outbreak. Also, on Friday, Merced County declared a state of emergency. This followed the March 4, 2020 state of emergency that was declared by Governor Newsom. The City of Merced City Manager also declared a local emergency as the Director of Emergency Services. On May 18, 2020, the City of Merced City Council ended the local emergency declaration for the City of Merced although financial impacts have continued due to the increase in COVID-19 spread in Merced County and continuous modified business operations put in place by Governor Newsom. Local businesses are also continuing to experience economic losses.

On January 7, 2021, the City received a request (attached) from the Merced Hotel Motel Association requesting that the credit card fees not be assessed through December 31, 2021. When a credit card is used as the form of payment, a credit card fee (currently 3.15%) is added to the TOT total to cover the issuing bank's processing fee. If the credit card fee is not assessed, the City would be responsible for paying the processing fee.

Local hotels pay the City TOT payments, equivalent to 10% of the cost of a room night. Hotels collect the TOT when the room night is paid for and then remit the TOT to the City quarterly.

Mr. Kainth states in the letter, "The hotel and lodging industry have been devastated with layoffs, furloughs, and closures." According to the American Hospitality & Lodging Association, the hotel industry was the first impacted by the pandemic and will be one of the last to recover. Hotels are still struggling to keep their doors open and unable to rehire all their staff due to the historic drop in travel demand. The Association also states that 72% of Americans said they were unlikely to travel for Thanksgiving and 69% were unlikely to travel for Christmas. Meanwhile, business and group travel are not expected to return to peak levels until 2023, compounding the challenges for the hotel industry during this public health crisis.

On January 19, 2021, the City Council directed staff to make the necessary modifications to the process to discontinue charging the credit card fees on convenience fee payments of their TOT from January 19, 2021 through July 31, 2021. In order for the customer to be able to qualify for the TOT discontinued convenience fee charge program, they have to be in good standing and not have any outstanding TOT. The attached resolution reflects this direction by the City Council.

IMPACT ON CITY RESOURCES

The City of Merced Finance Department averaged the annual collected TOT from 2017 to 2020 which totaled \$1,436,716.26. If the entire averaged TOT was paid by credit card, the convenience File #: 21-096 Meeting Date: 2/1/2021

fee would equal \$45,256.56.

Since the amount of TOT is expected to be less due to the pandemic and funding is needed for only 2 quarters through June 30, 2021, a supplemental appropriation of \$15,000 from the General Fund is needed and should be sufficient to cover the fees.

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MERCED, CALIFORNIA, AUTHORIZING THE CITY MANAGER TO PROVIDE ECONOMIC ASSISTANCE RELATED TO THE ECONOMIC IMPACTS OF COVID-19 AND TO ALLOW QUALIFIED PARTICIPANTS TO PAY THE TRANSIENT OCCUPANCY TAX WITH A CREDIT CARD WITHOUT ASSESSING THE PAYOR THE CREDIT CARD CONVENIENCE FEE

WHEREAS, international, national, state, and local health and governmental authorities are responding to an outbreak of respiratory disease caused by a novel coronavirus, ("COVID-19"); and

WHEREAS, on March 4, 2020, the Governor of the State of California declared a state of emergency to make additional resources available, formalize emergency actions already underway across multiple state agencies and departments, and help the state prepare for broader spread of COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, on March 13, 2020, the President of the United States of America declared a national emergency and announced that the federal government would make emergency funding available to assist state and local governments in preventing the spread of and addressing the effects of COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, the City Manager proclaimed the existence of a local emergency on March 13, 2020, which was ratified and affirmed by the City Council at its March 16, 2020 meeting; and

WHEREAS, on May 4, 2020, the City Council, at the request of the Director of Emergency Services, adopted resolution 2020-23, continuing the declaration of a local emergency; and

WHEREAS, on June 1, 2020, the City Council, at the request of the Director of Emergency Services, terminated our local emergency. However, the state and federal declaration of emergency remains in place; and

WHEREAS, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the California Department of Health, and the Merced County Health Officer have all issued various orders including shelter in place orders, orders to enforce social distancing, orders prohibited group events, and taken other precautions to protect public health and prevent transmission of this communicable virus; and

WHEREAS, as a result of the public health emergency and the precautions recommended by health authorities, businesses in Merced have and will continue to experience sudden and unexpected income loss; and

WHEREAS, on January 19, 2021, the City Council considered and approved a request from the Merced Hotel Motel Association for economic assistance related to the impacts of the COVID-19 emergency.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MERCED DOES HEREBY RESOLVE, DETERMINE, FIND, AND ORDER AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. The City Council hereby authorizes the City Manager to provide the following economic assistance related to the economic impacts of the COVID-19 emergency:

- A. Qualified local hotels will be allowed to pay the quarterly transient occupancy tax ("TOT") with a credit card for the quarters due on January 31, 2021, April 30, 2021, and July 31, 2021, without assessing the payor with a credit card convenience fee.
- B. To qualify for this economic assistance program the owner/operator/hotelier:
 - (1) Must be current on all of its fiscal obligations to the City and be in good standing; and
 - (2) TOT must be reported and paid by the due date following the end of each quarter as set forth in paragraph A; and
 - (2) Must be in compliance with all local, state, and federal statutes, rules, regulations including, but not limited to, the California fire code and the California building code during the term of the program; and

Must not be the subject of any regulatory or enforcement (3) action of the City.

SECTION 2. The City Council will review this economic assistance program at the second City Council meeting in August.

SECTION 3. The General Fund will be utilized to backfill the cost incurred related to this economic assistance program.

DISCUSSION

Background

The San Joaquin Valley Air Pollution Control District (SJVAPCD) Agricultural Tractor Replacement Program ("incentive program") provides funds for the replacement of in-use, off-road mobile equipment that are engaged in agricultural operations. The replacement of one (1) or more old, like equipment with one (1) new replacement equipment is eligible for funding. Funds are provided on a first come, first serve basis. An executed agreement with the SJVAPCD is required prior to purchase of any replacement equipment. Old equipment submitted as part of the program must be destroyed and rendered permanently in-operable after the new replacement equipment is placed into operation.

At the July 15, 2019 Council Meeting, Council approved the grant application to the San Joaquin Valley Air Pollution Control District (SJVAPCD) Agricultural Tractor Replacement Incentive Program to replace one tractor at the Wastewater Treatment Plant (WWTP). The SJVAPCD accepted our application as complete on August 1, 2019.

At the January 4, 2021 meeting, Council approved the purchase of the replacement tractor and the supplemental appropriation of \$260,000 to Fund 674 - Fleet Capital Replacement.

Grant Contract

Per the terms of the grant, the attached Heavy-Duty Engine Program Funding Agreement will need to be executed prior to purchasing the replacement tractor. Once the agreement has been signed by both parties, the replacement tractor can be purchased and staff will submit the reimbursement request to the SJVAPCD for the \$155,881.91 in grant monies.

Staff is requesting approval of the attached SJVAPCD grant contract.

IMPACT ON CITY RESOURCES

Fund 674 - Fleet Capital Replacement will be reimbursed \$155,881.91 of the \$260,000 cost of the replacement tractor.

This Agreement is not effective until all signatures and dates are placed on the signature page.

In consideration of their mutual promises, covenants, conditions, and the funds awarded under this Agreement and in compliance with the FARMER Program Guidelines, this project shall meet all program requirements for the full term of the Agreement, therefore the parties agree as follows:

PROGRAM

The purpose of this Agreement is to provide incentives to Participants in the District's Heavy-Duty Engine Program, which will assist the District in attaining federal and state air quality standards. Under this program, the District provides cash incentives to be used towards the purchase of new mobile off-road equipment to replace existing in-use mobile off-road equipment for use within the District, a map of which is attached hereto and incorporated herein as **Exhibit A**. Participant has agreed to undertake such participation.

2. DESCRIPTION OF CURRENT EQUIPMENT

Funding under this Agreement shall be utilized by Participant toward the replacement of the following equipment (hereinafter the "current equipment.") See **Exhibit B** attached hereto and incorporated herein.

3. DESCRIPTION OF NEW EQUIPMENT

A. Funding under this Agreement shall be utilized by Participant toward the purchase of the new equipment listed in **Exhibit B**; hereinafter the "new equipment", equipped with the new engine listed in **Exhibit B**; hereinafter the "new engine". The "new equipment" and "new engine" must not have been sold or associated with any rental or lease agreement and have less than 250 operating hours recorded on a permanently mounted non-resettable hour meter at the time of sale/purchase. The hour

meter must be functional for the duration of the Project Implementation Phase specified in Paragraph 5(B). If, after the execution of this Agreement, Participant purchases a piece of replacement equipment and/or engine other than as listed in **Exhibit B**, the alternative replacement equipment and/or engine must meet the following requirements. The alternative replacement equipment and/or engine must:

- 1. Be verified or certified to achieve at least equivalent or greater reductions than the new equipment and/or new engine listed in **Exhibit B**.
- 2. Meet all program eligibility requirements as the replacement equipment and/or engine.

Participant must receive prior approval by the District before purchasing the alternative replacement equipment and/or engine. If Participant does not receive prior approval from the District for the purchase of the alternative replacement equipment and/or engine, the District may deny the disbursement of project incentive funds.

4. OBLIGATIONS OF DISTRICT

- A. District shall provide **up to \$155,881.91** dollars to Participant to be used toward the purchase of a new piece of off-road mobile equipment, equipped with an engine meeting the most recent Model Year emission standard available, for the purpose of replacing one or more pieces of current, like equipment owned by the Participant.
- B. District shall make payment to Participant upon receipt and verification of a properly supported claim for payment request. Payment will be issued to Participant within **sixty (60) working days** of a completed project post-inspection which includes verification that the new equipment is operational and the current equipment has been properly destroyed in accordance with program requirements specified in **Exhibit C**; attached hereto and incorporated herein.
- C. Funding shall only be allowed toward purchase of the new equipment equipped with the new engine described in Paragraph 3(A).
- D. Payment(s) shall be made directly to Participant.

5. AGREEMENT TERMS

- A. Project Completion Terms (Milestones):
 - New Equipment Purchased (Delivered): The new equipment shall be purchased and delivered to Participant within one (1) year from the execution date of this agreement.
 - Claim for Payment Request for Reimbursement: Participant shall submit a complete claim for payment request to be reimbursed for the purchase of

- the new equipment within **sixty (60) days** from the purchase date of the new equipment, based on the invoice date of the new equipment.
- Current Equipment Destruction: The current equipment shall be permanently destroyed by a program approved dismantler in accordance with the equipment destruction requirements specified in Exhibit C within sixty (60) days of being replaced with new equipment, based on the invoice date of the new equipment.

If the Participant cannot meet the Project Completion Terms, the Participant must notify the District in writing with justification explaining why the Project Completion Terms cannot be met. Participant agrees to amend the Agreement as necessary, if requested by the District, to ensure the project is completed in a timely manner. Participant understands that even with written justification; the District does not guarantee an amendment will be made to the Agreement to adjust Project Completion Terms. Participant may be subject to conditions in Paragraph 9 for noncompliance with Project Completion Terms.

B. Project Implementation Phase – Participant shall own, operate, and maintain the new equipment according to the terms of this Agreement for a period of not less than the number of years as shown in **Exhibit B** from the date in which the new equipment is first placed into service.

6. ANNUAL REPORTING


- A. Participant is required to submit annual reports to the District. Participant shall submit annual reports on new equipment's operation, hours of operation, maintenance, and any other pertinent information requested by District on a form to be provided to Participant by District for the duration of the Project Implementation Phase specified in Paragraph 5(B).
- B. The first year annual report is due no later than eighteen (18) months after the project post-inspection and annually thereafter for the full term of the Agreement.
- C. Noncompliance with the annual reporting requirements shall require on-site monitoring by the District and/or the California Air Resources Board (ARB) and will impact the Participant's ability to receive funding from the District and/or ARB for future projects. Participants with reports that are more than six (6) months late will not be granted any additional grant funds from the District until all reports are satisfactorily submitted.
- D. In the event Participant does not meet the minimum annual hours of operation as specified in **Exhibit B**, as determined by a minimum three-year average, the Participant shall refund to District a pro-rated amount or agree to amend the Agreement if requested by the District.

E. If the Participant's reported annual usage is below the minimum annual hours specified in **Exhibit B**, Participant must describe on the annual report any conditions (such as weather, permits, major maintenance, etc.) that significantly impacted project usage. In instances where annual usage is significantly lower than the contracted level due to unforeseen circumstances beyond the control of the Participant, the Participant may request in writing a waiver from the District. A request for a waiver does not guarantee the waiver will be granted. Participant may be subject to conditions in Paragraph 9 for noncompliance with the annual reporting and/or annual usage requirements in this Agreement.

7. OBLIGATIONS OF PARTICIPANT

- A. Participant shall purchase the new equipment specified in Paragraph 3(A) to replace the current equipment specified in Paragraph 2. It is the responsibility of the Participant to ensure the new equipment purchased through this Agreement, including its engine, meet all program eligibility requirements. Participant must ensure the new equipment purchased through this Agreement adheres to all the requirements set forth in Paragraph 3(A). If the Participant purchases a piece of new equipment (including the engine) that is not eligible or does not meet program requirements, the District may deny the disbursement of project incentive funds.
- B. The Participant must ensure a working hour meter is in place and functional at all times to record the operational hours of the new equipment. If the hour meter should fail, the Participant shall immediately notify the District, and remains responsible for validating any hours not recorded. The Participant must either repair or replace the non-operating hour meter, at the Participant's expense, or provide other documentation of equipment operating hours acceptable to the District.
- C. In the event the Participant does not operate the new equipment for the duration of the Project Implementation Phase as specified in Paragraph 5(B), Participant shall refund to District a pro-rated amount or agree to amend the Agreement if requested by the District.
- D. Participant must operate the new equipment for the minimum annual hours of operation as specified in **Exhibit B**. Annual hours of operation will be documented by Participant on an annual report form as described in Paragraph 6.
- E. The Participant takes sole responsibility for ensuring that the new equipment is in operational condition throughout the Project Implementation Phase. The Participant shall maintain the new equipment according to the manufacturer's specifications for the full term of the Agreement. Tampering or any attempt to modify the new equipment is not allowed. Maintenance or repair costs related to the operation of the new equipment are not eligible for funding.
- F. If necessary, Participant shall obtain through other sources sufficient additional funds to purchase and install the new equipment specified herein.

- G. In the event Participant cannot obtain sufficient funds to complete the purchase, District reserves the right to terminate this Agreement. In that event, if requested by District, Participant shall return any District funds received.
- H. Prior to reimbursement and within **60 calendar days** of the purchase of the new equipment, Participant agrees to permanently disable and dispose of the current equipment listed in **Exhibit B** of this Agreement in accordance to the requirements specified in **Exhibit C** of this Agreement.
- I. Participant must purchase a warranty agreement for the new equipment. Warranty documentation must be submitted to the District prior to the reimbursement of any incentive funds. Warranty costs are not eligible for funding.
 - 1. Participant must purchase a minimum one-year or 1,600 hour power and drive train warranty for the new equipment. The warranty must cover parts and labor.
 - 2. If the purchase of the new equipment already includes a minimum one-year or 1,600 hour warranty, a separate supplemental warranty is not required.
- J. Participant agrees that the new equipment purchased through this program will serve the same function and perform the same work equivalent as the current equipment. Participant agrees to utilize the new equipment in such manners.
- K. Participant agrees to have the "Funded in part by the Valley Air District" sticker attached to the side of the hood of the new replacement equipment (sticker will be provided and attached by a District inspector during the post-inspection prior to receiving incentive reimbursement). Funding will not be dispersed if the aforementioned sticker is not attached and visible for the post-inspection pictures. See below for a picture of the 4"x5" sticker:



8. **GENERAL CONDITIONS**

- A. Participant agrees that at the date of execution of this Agreement, Participant has not yet purchased, made payment(s) toward, taken possession of, or ordered the new equipment.
- B. Participant agrees that, for the full term of this Agreement, District, ARB, or their designee(s) shall be allowed to inspect the new equipment and all records relating to the new equipment.
- C. District and ARB reserve the right to monitor and enforce the terms of this Agreement at any time during the Project Implementation Phase specified in Paragraph 5(B).
- D. Participant agrees that the equipment purchased shall be new, verified and certified by ARB for sale in California, and complies with all applicable durability and warranty requirements. The new equipment will replace the higher emission equipment currently owned by the Participant.
- E. Participant agrees that the horsepower rating for the new equipment shall be no greater than 125 percent of the current equipment's original manufacturer rated horsepower (baseline horsepower), unless otherwise approved by the District in limited situations and with documented justification.
 - For projects where two or more pieces of old, like equipment are replaced with one new replacement equipment, the horsepower rating for the replacement equipment must not be greater than 125 percent of the original manufacturer rated horsepower (baseline horsepower) for the lowest horsepower of the current equipment engines.
- F. Participant agrees that only the minimum attachments sold with the original equipment, as determined by the District, are eligible for reimbursement on the new equipment. Implements or attachments on the new equipment may be eligible for funding if the current equipment was also similarly equipped, and the new equipment requires such implements or attachments to perform the same functions and activities as the current equipment. District reserves the right to review such situations on a case-by-case basis.
- G. Participant agrees and represents that the new equipment is home based within the geographic boundaries of the District and shall remain so for the duration of the Project Implementation Phase as specified in Paragraph 5(B). (See **Exhibit A** for District map.)
- H. Participant certifies by signature on this Agreement that the current equipment was registered in ARB's Diesel Off-road On-line Reporting System (DOORS) at time of

application submittal if it is subject to the Regulation for In-Use Off-Road Diesel Vehicles (Off-Road Regulation). Participant is responsible for updating fleet information in DOORS as necessary after the destruction of the current equipment.

- I. If subject to the Off-Road Regulation, the Participant must submit to the District the DOORS Equipment Identification Number (EIN) of the new equipment no later than at post-inspection of the new equipment.
- J. Participant agrees to meet the percentage usage within the geographic boundaries of the District and California for the new equipment as specified in **Exhibit B**, with at least 50% of the hours of operation within the geographic boundaries of the District and 75% within California, whichever is greater, for the duration of the Project Implementation Phase as specified in Paragraph 5(B).
- K. Participant agrees and represents that purchase of the new equipment subject of this Agreement is not required by or to be used for compliance with any local, state, federal rule, regulation, settlement agreement, mitigation agreement, memorandum of understanding (MOU), memorandum of agreement (MOA), or other legal mandate currently in effect.
- L. Participant waives all rights to any emission reduction credits that may accrue as a result of purchase of the new equipment. Any such potential credits shall be the sole property of District.
- M. If the Participant intends to sell or transfer ownership of the new equipment during the Project Implementation Phase specified in Paragraph 5(B), the District must be notified by the Participant in writing of the intent and the District must approve the sale or transfer of ownership prior to the transaction. In the event Participant sells or transfers ownership of said new equipment during the Project Implementation Phase, Participant shall return, if requested by District, pro-rated funds to the District specified in Paragraph 4(A).
- N. The District reserves the right to reduce the incentive amount if it is determined that the actual costs paid by Participant are less than the costs indicated on the application. Additionally, District reserves the right to disallow certain ineligible costs submitted on the claim for payment request and thereby reduce the incentive amount. A determination of cost eligibility will be at the sole discretion of the District.
- O. The incentive amount provided to Participant for the purchase of the new equipment in this Agreement is based on the cost-effectiveness of the project. Should the cost-effectiveness of the project be affected after the completion of the project, the incentive amount may be reduced.
- P. An itemized invoice for a project must be received by the District before payment shall be made. A project invoice shall include enough detail to ensure only eligible project costs are being reimbursed, yet clear and concise enough to be understandable.

The District shall review the itemized invoice and only pay for eligible expenses. The District will not reimburse the Participant for any costs on the invoice which exceed the project incentive amount indicated in this Agreement in Paragraph 4(A). The District will pay the Participant the lower of the contract amount or the final invoice amount of eligible costs.

- Q. Payment will be issued to Participant upon the following:
 - 1. All required documents for a complete claim for payment request have been submitted to the District for approval.
 - Verification that the current equipment is/are disabled and disposed of in a manner consistent with the District's approved disposal methods specified in Exhibit C of this Agreement.
 - 3. Verification that the new equipment is operational and eligible.
- R. Participant is responsible for purchasing a certified new piece of equipment eligible for funding following current ARB Carl Moyer Program guidelines, policies and procedures. The new equipment and/or new engine shall meet the minimum following requirements:
 - 1. Interim Tier 4 (interim Tier 4, Tier 4 Phase-Out, Tier 4 Phase-In/Alternate NOx) and Tier 4 Final engines participating in the averaging, banking and trading program that are certified to family emission limits (FELs) higher than the applicable emission standards, as designated on ARB's Executive Order, are eligible to participate in the Carl Moyer Program. The appropriate emission factor for calculating emission reductions and cost-effectiveness shall be equivalent to the emission factors associated with the Tier 3 for engines 50 to 750 horsepower and Tier 2 for engines less than 50 horsepower or greater than 750 horsepower.
 - 2. Interim Tier 4 and Tier 4 engines participating in the averaging, banking and trading program that are certified to FEL below the applicable emission standards, as designated on ARB's Executive Order, are eligible to participate in the program. The appropriate emission factor for calculating emission reductions and cost-effectiveness shall be the emission factors associated with the applicable interim Tier 4, (interim Tier 4, Tier 4 Phase-Out, Tier 4 Phase-in/Alternate NOx) or Tier 4 Final emission standard.
 - 3. The engine in the new equipment must be certified to a NOx emission standard that is at least 15 percent lower than the emission standard(s) applicable to the existing engine and be certified to either the current applicable emission standard, or to a FEL NOx or NOx+non-methane hydrocarbons (NMHC) level that is lower than the required emission standard.

- 4. For CI equipment, engines that are participating in the "Tier 4 Early Introduction Incentive for Engine Manufacturers" program, as detailed in California Code of Regulations, title 13, section 2423(b)(6), are eligible for Carl Moyer Program funding provided that they are certified to the final Tier 4 emission standards. The ARB Executive Order for these engines indicates that the engines are certified under this provision. The emission rates for these engines used to determine cost-effectiveness shall be equivalent to the emission factors associated with Tier 3 engines.
- 5. Interim Tier 4 CI engines between 75 and 750 hp, certified to the Phase-In, Phase-Out, and Alternate NOx standards as detailed in California Code of Regulations, title 13, section 2423(b)(1)(B), are eligible for funding.
- 6. Equipment manufactured under the "Flexibility Provisions for Equipment Manufacturers", as detailed in California Code of Regulations, title 13, section 2423(d) are eligible for funding as replacement equipment, provided the equipment meets the Tier 3 or cleaner level. Eligible equipment produced under the flexibility provisions whose reference engine family is certified to an FEL are also subject to the provisions of section (1) or (2) above. Equipment manufactured under the "Flexibility Provisions for Equipment Manufacturers," with an engine whose reference engine family meets a standard, Tier or FEL less stringent than Tier 3 standard (or Tier 2 standard for engines less than 50 horsepower or greater than 750 horsepower), are ineligible for funding.
- 7. The certification emission standard and/or Tier designation for the engine must be determined from the Executive Order or United States Environmental Protection Agency Certificate of Conformity (for federally preempted engines) issued for that engine. ARB Executive Orders for off-road engines may be found at http://www.arb.ca.gov/msprog/offroad/cert/cert.php
- S. Participant attests by signature on this Agreement that the Participant (or designee) shall not submit another application or sign another agreement for the same specific equipment with any other grant funding source, including but not limited to, other Air Districts or to ARB for a multi-district solicitation, or any local, state or federal agency with the following exception:
 - 1. Starting July 1, 2011, participant may apply for and receive additional funding for the new equipment purchased through this Agreement from federal programs to reduce greenhouse gas emissions (GHG), or funding provided by the Alternative and Renewable Fuel and Vehicle Technology Program to reduce GHG. Should Participant apply for or receive this additional funding, Participant must disclose the funding source and total funding amount applied for or received to the District. The total public funds, Carl Moyer Program funds and federal funds, received by the Participant during the term of this Agreement cannot exceed 85 percent of the project cost. Participant shall

refund a portion of or all incentive funds provided by the District, as determined and requested by the District, should the Participant receive total public funds greater than 85 percent of the project cost.

- T. Participant certifies by signature on this Agreement that the Participant has disclosed all other public funds that Participant has applied for or received for the purchase of the new equipment in this Agreement. Participant also agrees to disclose to District the receipt of any public funds after the execution of this Agreement for the purchase of the new equipment.
- U. Participant certifies by signature on this Agreement that the Participant's fleet, engine(s), or equipment/vehicle is/are in compliance with all applicable federal, state, and local air quality rules and regulations at time of Agreement execution.
- V. Participant agrees to maintain compliance with all applicable federal, state, and local air quality rules and regulations for the full term of the Agreement as specified in Paragraph 5(B).
- W. Participant agrees that the new equipment purchased through this Agreement must be included when defining the size of the Participant's fleet for determining all applicable regulatory requirements.
- X. Participant agrees that throughout the Agreement term, the new equipment purchased through this Agreement must not be used in any way to generate credits or compliance extensions, and must be excluded when determining regulatory compliance.

9. REPERCUSSIONS FOR NONPERFORMANCE

- A. The Participant must operate the new equipment purchased through this Agreement according to the terms of the Agreement and cooperate with the District and ARB in implementation, monitoring, enforcement, and other efforts to assure the emission benefits are real, quantifiable, surplus, and enforceable.
- B. Repercussions for noncompliance with the requirements, terms, and conditions set forth in this Agreement shall result in, including but not limited to, the District cancelling the Agreement with Participant and recapturing project funds in proportion to any loss of emissions reductions as agreed to in this Agreement.
- C. District and ARB have authority to seek any remedies available under the law for noncompliance with Carl Moyer Program requirements and nonperformance with the Agreement. District may consider unforeseen circumstances beyond the Participant's control in determining repercussions for nonperformance.
- D. ARB, as an intended third party beneficiary, reserves the right to enforce the terms of this Agreement at any time during the contract term to ensure emission reductions are obtained.

10. INSURANCE

Participant shall provide District with proof of insurance for the new equipment in types and amounts approved by the District prior to any payment of funds under this Agreement.

11. FUNDING OUT

The terms of this Agreement and the services to be provided herein are contingent on the approval and receipt of funds by the appropriating government agency. Should sufficient funds not be allocated, the services provided may be modified or this Agreement terminated at any time by giving Participant 30 days' prior written notice.

12. NON-ASSIGNMENT

Neither party shall assign, transfer, or subcontract this Agreement, nor their rights or duties under this Agreement, without the prior express, written consent of the other party.

13. TERMINATION

District may immediately suspend or terminate this Agreement, in whole or in part, where in the determination of District there is:

- An illegal or improper use of funds;
- B. A failure to comply with any term of this Agreement; or
- C. A substantially incorrect or incomplete report submitted to District.

In no event shall any payment by District constitute a waiver by District of any breach of this Agreement or any default, which may then exist on the part of Participant. Neither shall such payment impair or prejudice any remedy available to District with respect to the breach or default. District shall have the right to demand of Participant the repayment to District of any funds disbursed to Participant under this Agreement, which, in the judgment of District, were not expended in accordance with the terms of this Agreement. Participant shall promptly refund any such funds upon demand. In addition to immediate suspension or termination, District and ARB have the authority to fine the Participant or seek any other remedies under law, in equity, or otherwise specified in this Agreement.

14. INDEMNIFICATION

Participant agrees to indemnify, save, hold harmless, and at District's request, defend District, its boards, committees, representatives, officers, agents, and employees from and against any and all costs and expenses (including reasonable attorneys' fees and litigation costs), damages, liabilities, claims, and losses (whether in agreement, tort, or

strict liability, including, but not limited to, personal injury, death, and property damage) occurring or resulting to District which arises from any negligent or wrongful acts or omissions of Participant, its officers, agents, subcontractors, or employees in their performance of this Agreement.

15. RECORD KEEPING

Participant shall maintain records sufficient to provide, on an annual basis for the term of this Agreement, information regarding annual hours of operation, fuel usage, general maintenance details, and any other available information, which may be deemed pertinent to the evaluation of the program. Participant shall maintain and retain records for at least two (2) years after Agreement expiration or three (3) years after the final project payment, whichever is later.

16. NOTICES

Any and all notices between District and Participant provided for or permitted under this Agreement or by law shall be in writing and shall be deemed duly served when personally delivered to one of the parties, or in lieu of such personal service, when deposited in the United States mail, postage prepaid, addressed to such party.

17. GOVERNING LAW

This Agreement shall be governed in all respects by the laws of the State of California. Venue for any action arising out of this Agreement shall only be in Fresno County, California.

18. TIME IS OF THE ESSENCE

It is understood that for Participant's performance under this Agreement, time is of the essence. The parties reasonably anticipate that Participant will, to the reasonable satisfaction of District, complete all activities provided herein within the time schedule outlined in this Agreement, provided that Participant is not caused unreasonable delay in such performance due to circumstances beyond the Participant's control.

19. ENTIRE AGREEMENT

This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between Participant and District with respect to the subject matter hereof and supersedes all previous negotiations, proposals, commitments, writings, advertisements, publications, and understandings of any nature whatsoever unless expressly included in this Agreement.

20. MODIFICATION

Any matters of this Agreement may be modified from time to time by the written consent of all the parties without in any way affecting the remainder.

21. NO FINANCIAL THIRD-PARTY BENEFICIARIES

Notwithstanding anything else stated to the contrary herein, it is understood that Participant's services and activities under this Agreement are being rendered only for the benefit of District, and no other person, firm, corporation, or entity shall be deemed an intended financial third-party beneficiary of this Agreement.


22. AUDIT



SAN JOAQUIN VALLEY UNIFIED AIR POLLUTION CONTROL DISTRICT

Current (Old) Equipment Disposal Requirements

Participant is required to dispose of the current equipment and its engine listed in **Exhibit B** of this Agreement in the following manner:

- The current equipment and its engine must be destroyed within 60 days of being replaced, as determined from the invoiced date of the new equipment. The Participant must transfer the current equipment and its engine for permanent destruction to a District approved dismantler within 30 days of receiving/purchasing the new equipment, as determined from the invoiced date of the new equipment.
- 2. The Participant is responsible for ensuring the current equipment and its engine are submitted to the dismantling facility in a timely manner to allow the dismantler ample time to properly destroy the equipment and engine within the 60 days time frame. The Participant is responsible for coordinating the destruction efforts with the dismantler.
- 3. Upon transfer of the current equipment and its engine, the Participant must obtain an acceptable receipt from the dismantler as described in the program specific Payment Procedures document.
- 4. The District approved dismantler has 30 days from the transfer date, as determined from the date on the receipt provided to Participant, to properly destroy the current equipment and its engine. The current equipment will, at a minimum, be rendered permanently inoperable by puncturing a significantly sized hole with serrated and uneven edges in the transmission casing and the axle housing. The engine block will be punctured with a minimum six-inch serrated, uneven hole which should include a portion of the oil pan rail.

Once the current equipment and its engine have been properly destroyed, the dismantler will notify the District to schedule an on-site post-inspection of the current equipment and engine.

The destruction of the old equipment and its engine by the Participant will render the project ineligible for funding. Funding is not available for the salvage of any existing equipment. The existing equipment salvage value will be negotiated between the Participant and the dismantler.

The District holds the Participant and dismantler responsible to ensure the disabled equipment and engine do not return to service. If the disabled equipment and/or engine is/are found to be operational at any time after the post-monitoring inspection, the Participant and/or dismantler will be subject to enforcement action by the District, including repayment of incentive funds, civil penalties, and any other legal action deemed appropriate.

REPORT IN BRIEF

Set a public hearing for March 1, 2021, to vacate a 32-foot-wide strip of right-of-way, containing approximately 19,627.87 square feet, generally located approximately 330 feet north of Yosemite Avenue between Mansionette Drive and Sandpiper Avenue (extended).

RECOMMENDATION

City Council - Adopt a motion adopting **Resolution 2021-05**, a Resolution of the City Council of the City of Merced, California, declaring its intention to vacate a 32-foot-wide strip of right-of-way, containing approximately 19,627.87 square feet, generally located approximately 330 feet north of Yosemite Avenue between Mansionette Drive and Sandpiper Avenue (extended) (Vacation #21-01), and setting time and place for Public Hearing.

ALTERNATIVES

- 1. Approve as recommended by staff; or,
- 2. Approve, subject to modifications by the City Council; or,
- 3. Deny; or,
- 4. Refer back to staff for reconsideration of specific items (specific items to be addressed in the motion); or,

AUTHORITY

Government Code Section 66477.5 (c) specifies the procedures for vacating land previously dedicated for public use, such as for parks and other public facilities. The City of Merced Administrative Policies and Procedures No. A-6 provides direction to staff for processing vacation requests, and City Council Resolution No. 86-90 establishes a policy concerning costs associated with the vacation.

CITY COUNCIL PRIORITIES

Not applicable.

DISCUSSION

File #: 21-047 Meeting Date: 2/1/2021

The proposed vacation is a request to vacate/abandon a 32-foot-wide strip of right-of-way located approximately 330 feet north of Yosemite Avenue between Mansionette Drive and Sandpiper Avenue (extended) (Attachment 1). This right-of-way was previously dedicated to the City for roadway purposes to allow the construction of an east/west road to connect Mansionette Drive and Sandpiper Avenue (extended). The east/west street was to be constructed as part of the police station that was once proposed on the parcel to the south of the right-of-way (refer to the location map at Attachment

When the City Council determined the police station would not be located on this parcel, the land was subsequently sold to Valley Children's Hospital. Through the development process for Valley Children's Hospital, it has been determined that the east/west road is no longer needed.

The original dedication for the road came from two different properties. The total right-of-way is 64 feet wide. The northern 32 feet was dedicated from the parcel on the north side of the right-of-way, shown as Parcel B on the Location Map at Attachment A. The southern 32 feet was dedicated from the parcel on the south side of the right-of-way (Attachment B), which is owned and being developed by Valley Children's Hospital (Parcel A). When property is vacated, it returns to the parcel from which it was dedicated. In this case the southern 32 feet will be returned to Parcel A, the parcel being developed by Valley Children's Hospital. The northern 32 feet is not being vacated at this time. The City is exploring how to use this remaining right-of-way, a bikeway/walking path has been considered, but definite plans have not been determined.

Staff is requesting the City Council adopt the resolution at Attachment 6 setting the public hearing for Vacation #21-01 for Monday, March 1, 2021.





SUBJECT: Approval of a Temporary Encroachment Permit #20-01 to Permit UC Merced to Install Banners on Various Light Poles Within the City for Three (3) Years with Authorization to Extend for an Additional Two (2) Years Upon Written Request by the Applicant and Approval of the City Manager

REPORT IN BRIEF

Considers approving a temporary encroachment permit to allow UC Merced to install banners on various light poles within the City.

RECOMMENDATION

City Council - Adopt a motion approving a temporary encroachment permit with UC Merced, to allow the placement of banners on City light poles in various locations and authorizing the City Manager or designee to execute the necessary documents.

ALTERNATIVES

- 1. Approve, as recommended by staff; or,
- 2. Deny the request; or,
- 3. Approve, subject to modifications as conditioned by Council; or,
- 4. Refer back to staff for reconsideration of specific items (specific items to be addressed in City Council motion); or,
- 5. Continue to a future City Council meeting (date and time to be specified in City Council motion).

AUTHORITY

City Charter Section 200, Merced Municipal Code section 13.38.040

DISCUSSION

UC Merced has requested permission to install banners on City-owned light poles along various City streets to help create a closer identity between the University and the community and to promote their academic programs. The UC had banners up throughout the City for several years, but their permit and expired and the banners were removed. Recently, the City Council approved similar banners promoting Merced College and the Downtown Farmer's Market. The City also uses similar banners to promote the Downtown, Christmas holidays, and other events. In order to allow someone other than the City to hang such banners, a Temporary Encroachment Permit is required.

UC Merced has requested to install banners at 30 locations, along Yosemite Avenue, Olive Avenue,

G Street, Main Street, Martin Luther King, Jr. Way, and R Street. The map and list at Attachment 1 shows the proposed locations for the banners. Each pole would have a banner on each side of the pole, and each banner would be double-sided (Attachment 2). The banners would be 30 inches wide and 96 inches tall. In comparison, the previous banners for UC Merced were 28 inches wide and 60 inches tall, and the banners recently approved from Merced College were 30 inches wide by 84 inches tall and the banners for the Downtown Farmer's Market were approved to be 30 inches wide and 94 inches tall.

If approved, the Temporary Encroachment Permit would allow the banners to be in place for three years. Upon written request to extend the time period, the City Manager would be authorized to extend the time period an additional 2 years.


The Temporary Encroachment Permit would be issued to the UC Merced. As such, the contractor would be required to provide all necessary insurance, indemnification, and be subject to compliance with all conditions of the Temporary Encroachment Permit. The UC has agreed to the terms of the permit and has signed the Temporary Encroachment Permit at Attachment 3. A letter from the Chancellor regarding the request for a Temporary Encroachment permit is provided at Attachment 4.

IMPACT ON CITY RESOURCES

There would be no impact on City resources as a result of the approval of this request. The contractor hired by UC Merced would be responsible for installation and all maintenance of the banners.



TEMPORARY ENCROACHMENT PERMIT

A Temporary Encroachment Permit (the "Permit") is hereby granted to The Regents of the University of California, on behalf of its Merced Campus, hereinafter called "Permittee", to allow banners for "UC Merced" to encroach in and upon real property, including street areas and City-owned light poles in various locations, subject to the following covenants and conditions:

- 1. Said encroachment shall be limited to the locations within the public rights-of-way for banners described in Exhibit A and for the locations shown in Exhibit B attached hereto for a period not to exceed three (3) years. Upon written request from Permittee at least one (1) month prior to the expiration of the Permit, the City Manager is authorized to extend the Permit for an additional two (2) year period upon Permittee's submittal of a new certificate of insurance.
- 2. The Permittee shall repair and replace said encroachment, and shall properly maintain the same in a condition free of defects at the sole cost of Permittee.
- 3. The Permittee shall repair or replace any damage caused in the encroachment area and/or other City facilities by the installation, existence, or removal of the encroachment, at Permittee's sole expense, within ten (10) days of notification from the City. This Permit notwithstanding, no encroachment may be installed without the prior written consent of the City.
- 4. The Permittee shall provide adequate provisions for the protection for the traveling public and to ensure minimum interference with pedestrian and/or street traffic at all times during the existence of the encroachment. Warning signs, lights and safety devices and/or other measures required for the public safety shall conform to the requirements of the City.
- 5. Neither the City of Merced or the City of Merced Public Financing and Economic Development Authority ("Authority") or their respective officials, officers, agents, or employees shall be responsible or liable for damage to any property installed or located within the easement area covered by this Permit. Said liability and responsibility shall be borne solely by the Permittee. Permittee, by accepting this

Permit, agrees to protect, defend (with counsel selected by the City), indemnify and hold the City of Merced, the Authority and their respective officials, officers, agents and employees, free and harmless from claims for damages of any kind whatsoever arising from or in connection with the installation and location of Permittee's property in the easement area covered by the Permit.

- 6. As a condition for and during the term of this Permit, the Permittee shall obtain and maintain in full force and effect at its own cost and expense, the following insurance coverage:
 - A. Workers' Compensation Insurance. Full workers' compensation insurance shall be provided with a limit of at least One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000) for any one person and as required by law.
 - В. General Liability Insurance. Permittee shall obtain and keep in full force and effect a commercial, general liability policy or policies of at least One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) combined limit for bodily injury and property damage; provided that the City, the Authority and their respective officials, officers, agents, and employees are to be named additional insureds under the policies, and that the policies shall stipulate that this insurance will operate as primary general liability insurance for Permittee and its employees, agents, contractors, and sub-contractors, and that no other insurance effected by City, the Authority or other named insureds will be called on to cover a loss covered thereunder. The General Liability insurance shall be provided by an ISO Commercial General Liability policy, with edition dates of 1985, 1988, or 1990. The City and Authority shall be named as an additional insured using ISO form CG 20 10 11 85 or the same form with an edition date no later than 1990.
 - C. Certificate of Insurance. Permittee shall complete and file with the City prior to engaging in any operation or activity set forth in this Permit, certificates of insurance evidencing coverage as set forth above and which shall provide that no cancellation or expiration by the insurance company will be made during the term of this Permit, without thirty (30) days written notice to City prior to the effective date of such cancellation—including cancellation for non-payment of premium. In lieu of the ISO form CG20 10 11 85 with an edition date no later than 1990, City will accept certified copies of the insurance

- policy or policies with the endorsements and cancellation provisions required by this provision.
- 7. During the term of the Permit, the Permittee shall comply, and cause to comply, with all applicable federal, state, and local laws, statutes, rules, regulations, resolutions, and policies, both now existing and as amended in the future, including but not limited to the Americans with Disabilities Act.
- 8. This Permit does not constitute a deed or grant of any easement by the City of Merced, and is transferable or assignable only with the prior written permission of the City of Merced, and is revocable at any time with or without notice by the City of Merced at its sole and absolute discretion. The Permittee shall remove or relocate the banners, without compensation, if required by public need or purpose identified by the City.
- 9. Unless the City of Merced abandons its interest in said property, Permittee, by accepting this Permit, guarantees the prompt removal of any and all structures herein permitted and/or located within the public right-of-way easement subject to this Permit upon notification from the City of Merced that this Permit has been revoked.
- 10. Consistent with the conditions in Section 2 above, the Permittee understands and agrees, by accepting this Permit, that the City has the right to remove the encroachment at its own expense without compensation to the Permittee if necessary for any City purposes.
- 11. This Permit shall not become effective until receipt by the City of Merced of a copy of this Permit with properly signed endorsements accepting the same, subject to terms and conditions contained herein.
- 12. This Temporary Encroachment Permit is to be cancelled and is void and of no further effect upon the recording of abandonment of the right-of-way to be filed for record by the City of Merced, affecting the herein described property.
- 13. This Permit is issued with the understanding that any particular action is not to be considered as establishing any precedent: (1) on the question of permitting any certain kind of encroachment to be erected within the right-of-way or easement area of the City of Merced; or (2)

as to the acceptability of any such permits as to any other or future situation.

14. The banners shall be installed per City requirements as determined by the Public Works Department. In no case, shall the banners be mounted lower than fourteen (14) feet above grade (bottom of banner must be at least fourteen (14) feet above grade). In addition, no banner shall be mounted on light poles that contain traffic signal poles. For those intersections, the nearest light pole from the intersection, which does not contain a traffic signal, shall be used. Any changes to the banner locations shall be approved by the City's Planning Manager or referred back to the City Council, if necessary.





REPORT IN BRIEF

The City intends to receive federal financial assistance from the U.S. Department of Transportation (DOT) through the California Department of Transportation (Caltrans), and as a condition of receiving this assistance, the City will sign the California Department of Transportation Disadvantaged Business Enterprise Implementation Agreement.

RECOMMENDATION

City Council - Adopt a motion approving the California Department of Transportation (CALTRANS) Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) Implementation Agreement for Federally Funded Construction Projects.

ALTERNATIVES

- 1. Approve, as recommended; or,
- 2. Deny.

AUTHORITY

All public agencies utilizing Federal-Aid funds for construction projects are required by Title 49 CFR, Part 26, to adopt a Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) Program Plan.

CITY COUNCIL PRIORITIES

Local Streets - Overall Streets, Sidewalks, and Street Lights

DISCUSSION

The City of Merced has adopted a Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) Program, and Council has amended the program as necessary by supplemental actions.

As of May 1, 2006, the California Department of Transportation and its federal transportation assistance sub-recipients (the City of Merced) implemented a DBE race-neutral program pending the results of a more comprehensive study of the facts regarding the race-conscious DBE Program. The City of Merced has been following these guidelines.

The City of Merced adopted the DBE Program that has been established by Caltrans, since we will now be a sub-recipient and part of the statewide overall DBE Program. The City of Merced adopted a Race Conscious Implementation Agreement at its April 6, 2009, City Council Meeting.

The City intends to receive federal financial assistance from the U.S. Department of Transportation (DOT) through the California Department of Transportation (Caltrans), and as a condition of receiving this assistance, the City will sign the California Department of Transportation Disadvantaged Business Enterprise Implementation Agreement. Through the agreement, the City agrees to implement the State of California, Department of Transportation Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) Program Plan as it pertains to Local Agencies. The DBE Program Plan is based on U.S. Department of Transportation (DOT), 49 CFR 26 requirements. It is the policy of City to ensure that DBEs, as defined in 49 CFR 26, have an equal opportunity to receive and participate in DOT-assisted contracts. It is also the City's Policy:

- To ensure nondiscrimination in the award and administration of DOT-assisted contracts.
- To create a level playing field on which DBE's can compete fairly for DOT-assisted contracts.
- To ensure that the DBE participation percentage is narrowly tailored, in accordance with applicable law.
- To ensure that only firms that fully meet 49 CFR 26 eligibility standards are permitted to participate as DBEs.
- To help remove barriers to the participation of DBEs in Federal-aid contracts.
- To assist the development of firms that can compete successfully in the marketplace outside the DBE Program.

CALIFORNIA DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION (CALTRANS) DISADVANTAGED BUSINESS ENTERPRISE (DBE) IMPLEMENTATION AGREEMENT

For the City/County of	CITY OF MERCED	, hereinafter referred to as	"SUB-RECIPIENT."
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I. Definition of Terms

The terms used in this agreement have the meanings defined in 49 CFR 26.5.

II. Objective/Policy Statement (49 CFR 26.1 and 26.23)

SUB-RECIPIENT intends to receive federal financial assistance from the U. S. Department of Transportation (DOT) through the California Department of Transportation (Caltrans), and as a condition of receiving this assistance, SUB-RECIPIENT will sign the California Department of Transportation Disadvantaged Business Enterprise Implementation Agreement (hereinafter referred to as Agreement). SUB-RECIPIENT agrees to implement the State of California, Department of Transportation Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) Program Plan (hereinafter referred to as the DBE Program Plan) as it pertains to Local Agencies. The DBE Program Plan is based on U.S. Department of Transportation (DOT), 49 CFR 26 requirements. It is the policy of SUB-RECIPIENT to ensure that DBEs, as defined in 49 CFR 26, have an equal opportunity to receive and participate in DOT-assisted contracts. It is also SUB-RECIPIENT's policy:

- To ensure nondiscrimination in the award and administration of DOT-assisted contracts.
- To create a level playing field on which DBE's can compete fairly for DOT-assisted contracts.
- To ensure that the DBE participation percentage is narrowly tailored, in accordance with applicable law.
- To ensure that only firms that fully meet 49 CFR 26 eligibility standards are permitted to participate as DBEs.
- To help remove barriers to the participation of DBEs in Federal-aid contracts.
- To assist the development of firms that can compete successfully in the market place outside the DBE Program.

III. Nondiscrimination (49 CFR 26.7)

SUB-RECIPIENT will never exclude any person from participation in, deny any person the benefits of, or otherwise discriminate against anyone in connection with the award and performance of any contract covered by 49 CFR 26 on the basis of race, color, sex, or national origin. In administering the Local Agency components of the DBE Program Plan, SUB-RECIPIENT will not, directly, or through contractual or other arrangements, use criteria or methods of administration that have the effect of defeating or substantially impairing accomplishment of the objectives of the DBE Program Plan with respect to individuals of a particular race, color, sex, or national origin.

IV. Annual DBE Submittal Form (49 CFR 26.21)

SUB-RECIPIENT will provide to the Caltrans District Local Assistance Engineer (DLAE) a completed Local Agency DBE Annual Submittal Form (Exhibit 9-B), by June 30 of each year for the following Federal Fiscal Year (FFY). This form must include the name, phone number, email address of the designated Disadvantaged Business Enterprise Liaison Officer (DBELO), and the choice of Prompt Pay Provision to be used by SUB-RECIPIENT for the following FFY.

V. Race-Neutral Means of Meeting Caltrans Overall Statewide Annual DBE Goal (49 CFR 26.51(a))

Caltrans expects SUB-RECIPIENT to meet the maximum feasible portion of Caltrans Overall Statewide Annual DBE Goal through race-neutral means of facilitating DBE participation. Race-neutral DBE participation includes when a DBE wins a prime contract through customary competitive procurement procedures, is awarded a subcontract on a prime contract that does not carry a DBE goal, or even if there is a DBE goal, wins a subcontract from a prime contractor that did not consider its DBE status in making the award (e.g., a prime contractor that uses a strict low-bid system to award subcontracts). Race-neutral means include, but are not limited to, the following:

- Arranging solicitations, times for the presentation of bids, quantities, specifications, and delivery schedules in ways that facilitate the participation of DBE and other small businesses (e.g., unbundling large contracts to make them more accessible to small businesses, requiring or encouraging prime contractors to subcontract portions of work that they might otherwise perform with their own forces);
- Providing assistance in overcoming limitations such as inability to obtain bonding or financing (e.g., by such means as simplifying the bonding process, reducing bonding requirements, eliminating the impact of surety costs from bids, and providing services to help DBEs and other small businesses obtain bonding and financing);
- 3. Providing technical assistance and other services;
- 4. Carrying out information and communication programs on contracting procedures and specific contract opportunities (e.g., ensuring the inclusion of DBEs and other small businesses on SUB-RECIPIENT mailing lists of bidders; ensuring the dissemination to bidders on prime contracts of lists of potential subcontractors; provision of information in languages other than English, where appropriate);
- Implementing a supportive services program to develop and improve immediate and long-term business management, record keeping, and financial and accounting capability for DBEs and other small businesses;
- Providing services to help DBEs and other small businesses improve long-term development, increase opportunities to participate in a variety of types of work, handle increasingly significant projects, and achieve eventual self-sufficiency;
- 7. Establishing a program to assist new, start-up firms, particularly in fields in which DBE participation has historically been low;
- 8. Ensuring distribution of your DBE directory through print and electronic means to the widest feasible universe of potential prime contractors; and

9. Assisting DBEs and other small businesses to develop their capability to utilize emerging technology and conduct business through electronic media.

VI. Race-Conscious Means of Meeting Caltrans Overall Statewide Annual DBE Goal (49 CFR 26.51(d))

SUB-RECIPIENT must establish DBE contract goals to meet any portion of Caltrans Overall Statewide Annual DBE Goal that cannot be achieved through race-neutral means.

VII. Quotas (49 CFR 26.43)

SUB-RECIPIENT will not use quotas or set-asides in any way in the administration of the Local Agency component of the DBE Program Plan.

VIII. DBE Liaison Officer (DBELO) (49 CFR 26.25)

SUB-RECIPIENT has designated a DBE Liaison Officer. The DBELO is responsible for implementing the DBE Program Plan as it pertains to the SUB-RECIPIENT, and ensures that the SUB-RECIPIENT is fully and properly advised concerning DBE Program Plan matters. [Specify resources available to the DBELO; e.g., the DBELO has a staff of two professional employees assigned to the DBE program on a full-time basis and two support personnel who devote a portion of their time to the program.] The name, address, telephone number, email address, and an organization chart displaying the DBELO's position in the organization are found in Attachment A to this Agreement. This information will be updated annually and included on the DBE Annual Submittal Form.

The DBELO is responsible for developing, implementing, and monitoring the SUB-RECIPIENT's requirements of the DBE Program Plan in coordination with other appropriate officials. Duties and responsibilities include the following:

- 1. Gathers and reports statistical data and other information as required.
- Reviews third party contracts and purchase requisitions for compliance with this program.
- 3. Works with all departments to determine DBE contract goals.
- 4. Ensures that bid notices and requests for proposals are made available to DBEs in a timely manner.
- 5. Analyzes DBE participation and identifies ways to encourage participation through raceneutral means.
- 6. Participates in pre-bid meetings.
- 7. Advises the CEO/governing body on DBE matters and DBE race-neutral issues.
- 8. Provides DBEs with information and recommends sources to assist in preparing bids, obtaining bonding and insurance.
- Plans and participates in DBE training seminars.
- Provides outreach to DBEs and community organizations to fully advise them of contracting opportunities.

IX. Federal Financial Assistance Agreement Assurance (49 CFR 26.13)

Each agreement SUB-RECIPIENT signs with Caltrans must include the following assurance: The SUB-RECIPIENT shall not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national origin, or sex in the award and performance of any DOT-assisted contract, or in the administration of its DBE Program, or the requirements of 49 CFR 26. The SUB-RECIPIENT shall take all necessary and reasonable steps under 49 CFR 26 to ensure nondiscrimination in the award and administration of DOT-assisted contracts. The SUB-RECIPIENT's DBE Program, as required by 49 CFR 26 and as approved by DOT, is incorporated by reference in this agreement. Implementation of this program is a legal obligation and failure to carry out its terms shall be treated as a violation of this agreement. Upon notification to the SUB-RECIPIENT of its failure to carry out its approved program, Caltrans may impose sanctions as provided for under 49 CFR 26 and may, in appropriate cases, refer the matter for enforcement under 18 U.S.C. 1001 and/or the Program Fraud Civil Remedies Act of 1986 (31 U.S.C. 3801 et seq.).

Each contract Sub-recipient signs with a contractor (and each subcontract the prime contractor signs with a subcontractor) must include the following assurance:

The contractor or subcontractor shall not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national origin, or sex in the performance of this contract. The contractor shall carry out applicable requirements of 49 CFR 26 in the award and administration of DOT-assisted contracts. Failure by the contractor to carry out these requirements is a material breach of this contract, which may result in the termination of this contract or such other remedy, as the Sub-recipient deems appropriate.

X. DBE Financial Institutions (49 CFR 26.27)

SUB-RECIPIENT must investigate the full extent of services offered by financial institutions owned and controlled by socially and economically disadvantaged individuals in the community to make reasonable efforts to use these institutions, and to encourage prime contractors on DOT-assisted contracts to make use of these institutions.

Information on the availability of such institutions can be obtained from the DBELO. The Caltrans Disadvantaged Business Enterprise Program may offer assistance to the DBELO.

XI. Directory (49 CFR 26.31)

SUB-RECIPIENT will refer interested persons to the Unified Certification Program DBE directory available from the Caltrans Disadvantaged Business Enterprise Program's <u>website</u>.

XII. Required Contract Clauses (49 CFR 26.13 and 26.29)

For the purpose of this section, contractor also means consultant, and subcontractor also includes subconsultant. For prompt payment, the following State regulations are referenced: the California Business and Professions Code (CBPC), California Public Contract Code (CPCC) and California Civil Code (CCC).

SUB-RECIPIENT ensures that the following clauses or equivalent will be included in each DOTassisted prime contract:

A. Contract Assurance

The contractor or subcontractor shall not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national origin, or sex in the performance of this contract. The contractor shall carry out applicable requirements of 49 CFR 26 in the award and administration of DOT-assisted contracts. Failure by the contractor to carry out these requirements is a material breach of this contract, which may result in the termination of this contract or such other remedy, as SUB-RECIPIENT deems appropriate.

NOTE: This language is to be used verbatim, as is stated in Exhibit 12-G: Required Federal-aid Contract Language. See also 49 CRF 26.13(b).

B. Prompt Payment

Prompt Progress Payment to Subcontractors

The Local Agency shall require contractors and subcontractors to pay their subcontractors within seven (7) days for construction contracts, and within fifteen (15) days for consultant contracts, after receiving each progress payment. Any delay or postponement of payment may take place only for good cause and with the Local Agency's prior written approval. Any violation of these provisions shall subject the violating contractor or subcontractor to the penalties, sanctions and remedies specified in Section 7108.5 of the CBPC and Section 10262 of the CPCC for construction contract, and Section 3321 of the CCC for consultant contract. This requirement shall not be construed to limit or impair any contractual, administrative, or judicial remedies, otherwise available to the contractor or subcontractor in the event of a dispute involving late payment or nonpayment by the contractor, deficient subcontractor performance, and/or noncompliance by a subcontractor. This clause applies to both DBE and non-DBE subcontractors.

Prompt Payment of Withheld Funds to Subcontractors

The Local Agency shall ensure prompt and full payment of retainage from the prime contractor to the subcontractor within seven (7) days for construction contracts, or within fifteen (15) days for consultant contracts after the subcontractor's work is satisfactorily completed and accepted. This shall be accompanied by including; either (1), (2), or (3) of the following provisions [Local Agency equivalent will need Caltrans approval] in their federal-aid contracts to ensure prompt and full payment of retainage [withheld funds] to subcontractors in compliance with 49 CFR 26.29.

1. No retainage will be held by the Local Agency from progress payments due to the prime contractor. Prime contractors and subcontractors are prohibited from holding retainage from subcontractors. Any delay or postponement of payment may take place only for good cause and with the Local Agency's prior written approval. Any violation of these provisions shall subject the violating contractor or subcontractor to the penalties, sanctions, and other remedies specified in Section 7108.5 of the CBPC and Section 10262 of the CPCC for construction contracts, and Section 3321 of the CCC for consultant contracts. This requirement shall not be construed to limit or impair any contractual, administrative, or judicial remedies, otherwise available to the contractor or subcontractor in the event of a dispute involving late payment or nonpayment by the contractor, deficient subcontractor performance, and/or noncompliance by a subcontractor. This clause applies to both DBE and non-DBE subcontractors.

- 2. No retainage will be held by the Local Agency from progress payments due to the prime contractor. Any retainage kept by the prime contractor or by a subcontractor must be paid in full to the earning subcontractor within seven (7) days for construction contracts, or within fifteen (15) days for consultant contracts after the subcontractor's work is satisfactorily completed. Any delay or postponement of payment may take place only for good cause and with the Local Agency's prior written approval. Any violation of these provisions shall subject the violating contractor or subcontractor to the penalties, sanctions, and remedies specified in Section 7108.5 of the CBPC and Section 10262 of the CPCC for construction contracts, and Section 3321 of the CCC for consultant contracts. This requirement shall not be construed to limit or impair any contractual, administrative, or judicial remedies, otherwise available to the contractor or subcontractor in the event of a dispute involving late payment or nonpayment by the contractor, deficient subcontractor performance, and/or noncompliance by a subcontractor. This clause applies to both DBE and non-DBE subcontractors.
- The Local Agency shall hold retainage from the prime contractor and shall make prompt and regular incremental acceptances of portions, as determined by the Local Agency of the contract work and pay retainage to the prime contractor based on these acceptances. The prime contractor or subcontractor shall return all monies withheld in retention from all subcontractors within seven (7) days for construction contracts, or within fifteen (15) days for consultant contracts after receiving payment for work satisfactorily completed and accepted including incremental acceptances of portions of the contract work by the Local Agency. Any delay or postponement of payment may take place only for good cause and with the Local Agency's prior written approval. Any violation of these provisions shall subject the violating prime contractor to the penalties, sanctions, and other remedies specified in Section 7108.5 of the CBPC and Section 10262 of the CPCC for construction contracts, and Section 3321 of the CCC for consultant contracts. This requirement shall not be construed to limit or impair any contractual, administrative, or judicial remedies, otherwise available to the contractor or subcontractor in the event of: a dispute involving late payment or nonpayment by the contractor; deficient subcontractor performance; and/or noncompliance by a subcontractor. This clause applies to both DBE and non-DBE subcontractors.

Any violation of these provisions shall subject the violating prime contractor or subcontractor to the penalties, sanctions and other remedies specified therein. These requirements shall not be construed to limit or impair any contractual, administrative, or judicial remedies otherwise available to the prime contractor or subcontractor in the event of a dispute involving late payment or nonpayment by the prime contractor, deficient subcontract performance, or noncompliance by a subcontractor.

XIII. Local Assistance Procedures Manual (LAPM)

The SUB-RECIPIENT will advertise, award and administer Federal-aid contracts in accordance with the current <u>Local Assistance Procedures Manual (LAPM)</u> including <u>Forms and Exhibits</u>.

XIV. Vehicle Manufacturers/Specialized Equipment (§26.49)

If Federal-aid contracts will include vehicle/specialized equipment procurements, SUB-RECIPIENT will require each vendor, as a condition of being authorized to bid or propose on vehicle/specialized equipment procurements, to certify that it has complied with the requirements of 49 CFR 26.69.

XV. Reporting to the DLAE

SUB-RECIPIENT will promptly submit a copy of the Consultant Proposal DBE Commitment (Exhibit 10-O1) at the time of award of the consultant contract.

SUB-RECIPIENT will promptly submit a copy of Consultant Contract DBE Information (Exhibit 10-O2) or the Local Agency Bidder DBE Commitment (Construction Contracts) (Exhibit 15-G) to the DLAE within 30 days after execution of consultant or construction contract.

SUB-RECIPIENT will promptly submit a copy of the Final Report-Utilization of DBE, First-Tier Subcontractors (Exhibit 17-F) of the LAPM, immediately upon completion of each consultant or construction contract.

XVI. Certification (§26.83(a))

SUB-RECIPIENT ensures that only DBE firms currently certified by the California Unified Certification Program (CUCP) will participate as DBEs on Federal-aid contracts.

XVII. Confidentiality

SUB-RECIPIENT will safeguard from disclosure to third parties, information that may reasonably be regarded as confidential business information consistent with federal, state, and local laws.

XVIII. Prompt Payment from the Local Agency to the Contractors (California Public Contract Code §20104.50)

The Local Agency shall make any progress payment within **30 days** after receipt of an undisputed and properly submitted payment request from a contractor on a construction contract. If the Local Agency fails to pay promptly, the Local Agency shall pay interest to the contractor, which accrues at the rate of 10 percent per annum on the principal amount of a money judgment remaining unsatisfied. Upon receipt of a payment request, the Local Agency shall act in accordance with both of the following:

- (1) Each payment request shall be reviewed by the Local Agency as soon as practicable after receipt for the purpose of determining that the payment request is a proper payment request.
- (2) Any payment request determined not to be a proper payment request suitable for payment shall be returned to the contractor as soon as practicable, but not later than **seven (7) days**, after receipt. A request returned pursuant to this paragraph shall be accompanied by a document setting forth in writing the reasons why the payment request is not proper.

SECTION 1

1.1 PARTICIPATING DEPARTMENTS

- 1.1.1 City of Merced Parks and Recreation Department
- 1.1.2 City of Merced Police Department
- 1.1.3 County of Merced Probation Department

SECTION 2

2.1 INTRODUCTION

- 2.1.1 The City Council's adopted Goals & Priorities endorses partnerships with the other Governmental entities to advance the quality of life for all those living or working in our city.
- 2.1.2 The County implements and provides oversight and supervision of a community service work program for adults and juveniles.
- 2.1.3 The City and County recognize the opportunity for positive community service experiences is a benefit to the community, the community service workers participating in the community service programs and the agencies.

2.2 STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

2.2.1 The purpose of this MOU is to establish a collaborative working relationship among the parties and participating departments and to document the responsibilities of each party relative to the provision of the Community Service Program (CSP). The goal of this collaboration is to provide a positive community service program that benefits the community, the participants, and the agencies.

3. TERM

3.1 The term of this Agreement is ongoing, with the effective commencement date being January 1, 2021. This MOU may be amended only in writing with signed approval of all parties to this MOU. A representative of any party can request a review of the MOU at any time if deemed necessary for operational effectiveness. Either party may elect to terminate its participation in this MOU by providing written notification to the other party. Termination will take effect not less than thirty (30) days after receipt of written notification or upon a date established by mutual agreement.

4. RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE PARTIES

4.1 Responsibilities of Merced County Probation Department

- 4.1.1 Provide, operate, supervise, and maintain the adult and juvenile CSP.
- 4.1.2 Provide eligible community service program participants.
- 4.1.3 Provide a designated County representative to collaborate and coordinate with the participating departments.
- 4.1.4 Provide or arrange for transportation, as necessary, for persons participating in the CSP.
- 4.1.5 Participate in and provide representation for quarterly MOU meetings.

4.2 Responsibility of City of Merced Participating Departments

- 4.2.1 Provide CSP participants with the supplies necessary to perform public space clean-up/beautification work.
- 4.2.2 Provide feedback to the County regarding CSP program participants work performance.
- 4.2.3 Provide a designated city representative for each participating department to coordinate and collaborate with the County representative.
- 4.2.4 Participate in and provide representation for quarterly MOU meetings.

5. <u>INDEMNIFICATION</u>

5.1 Each party shall be proportionally responsible for damages caused by the negligence and willful misconduct of its directors, officers, agents, employees and duly authorized volunteers occurring in the performance of this Agreement. It is the intention of the Parties that this paragraph be interpreted to impose on each party the responsibility for the negligence and

willful misconduct of their respective directors, officers, employees, and duly authorized volunteers.

6. <u>CSP PARTICIPANTS INSURANCE</u>

6.1 The CSP program participants shall be covered by the County's General Liability and Workers Compensation insurance.

7. STATUS OF CSP PARTICIPANTS

7.1 CSP participants shall at no time throughout the term of this Agreement be considered officers, employees, or agents of the City of Merced. CSP participants shall not be entitled to any compensation or benefits applicable to city employees. County shall defend, indemnify, and hold City harmless for any claims by any CSP participant to compensation or benefits applicable to city employees for work performed by the CSP participant pursuant to this MOU.

8. SURVIVAL

8.1 Upon termination of this Agreement for any reason, paragraphs 5, 6 and 7 shall survive the expiration or earlier termination of this Agreement.

9. <u>SEVERABILITY</u>

9.1 If any provision of this Agreement is held invalid by any law, rule, order of regulation of any government or by the final determination of any state or federal court, such invalidity shall not affect the enforceability of any other provision not held to be invalid.



SECTION 4. SEVERABILITY. If any section, subsection, subdivision, sentence, clause, phrase, or portion of this Ordinance, is for any reason held to be invalid or unconstitutional by the decision of any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining

portions of this Ordinance.
