1	City residents elect a seven member city council to serve as the City's legislative governing body.	Page 3-5, paragraph 1	The number of members on our City Council was incorrect.	July 17, 2017
2	Population projections for the City are based on the Merced County Forecast summary, dated July 7, 2016. These population projections are available through the Merced County Association of Governments (MCAG) website and are more up to date than the General Plan projections. The General Plan also relies on MCAG for their population projections, but is based on an older projection. Therefore, the data source for the UWMP is consistent with the General	Page 3-8, paragraph 2	Clarification to source of population projections.	July 17, 2017

	Plan population projection, but is more up to date.			
3	Water demands for 2015 are based on real time demands and are low, since California Cities were mandated to reduce water usage. Water demands for 2020 are based on the City's targeted per capita demand of 248 gpcd and the projected service area population. The large jump in demand from 2015 to 2020 is credited to an increase in the projected per capita demand.	Page 4-5, Insert footnote in Table 4.4	Clarify why the difference between water use for 2015 and 2020 is 9,000 acre feet.	July 17, 2017
4	An adjudication consists of a groundwater basin in which all rights to water could be defined by a court. As a non-adjudicated basin, there are no defined legal pumping rights for the City and there are no legal constraints on groundwater pumping.	Page 6-1, paragraph 6	Define the term "non-adjudicated basin".	July 17, 2017
5	The City's Water Master Plan recommends the conjunctive use of surface water and groundwater to meet future demands. This can be accomplished by acquiring surface water and the use of a Surface Water Treatment Plant. The City through MAGPI has a memorandum of understating (MOU) for conjunctive use with the Merced Irrigation District (MID), involving the exchange of tertiary treated wastewater for MID canal water (surface water).	Page 7-4, insert as paragraph 2	Cite the City's planning document that considers the addition of potential surface water supply.	July 17, 2017
6	The City intends to pursue groundwater recharge projects and will continue efforts along with their partnering agencies through the GSP.	Page 6-20, insert as paragraph 3	Include additional text regarding the City's intent to develop groundwater recharge projects.	July 17, 2017
