Key Points:

- Per People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals, Inc. v. Gittens (2005) 414 F.3d 23, while the First Amendment's Free Speech Clause limits regulation of private speech, it does not restrict the government when the government speaks for itself. The government speech doctrine, as defined by the United States Supreme Court, provides that the government can advance its own speech without requiring viewpoint neutrality when the government itself is the speaker, so long as the government does not show religious preference or encourage a certain vote in an election.
- A set period of time and place of display should be set.
